### POPULATION : WASHINGTON

#### NUMBER OF INHABITANTS, BY COUNTIES AND MINOR CIVIL DIVISIONS

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#### TOTAL POPULATION, INCREASE, AND DISTRIBUTION.

Population of the state.—Washington was organized as a territory in 1853 and was admitted to the Union as the forty-second state in 1889. According to the Fourteenth Census, taken as of January 1, 1920, its population is 1,356,621, which represents an increase of 214,631, or 18.8 per cent, over the population in

1910. During the same period the population of the United States increased by 14.9 per cent. The following summary shows the population of Washington from 1860 to 1920, inclusive, with the number and per cent of increase for each decade, in comparison with the per cent of increase for the United States:

Counties.—Washington has 39 counties, of which 14 show decreases as compared with 1910. (See Table 1.) Because of the organization of Pend Oreille County from a part of Stevens County in 1911, it has been necessary, in preparing the maps on page 3, showing rates of increase or decrease in total and rural population, to combine these two counties. No annexations of territory were made during the decade.

Density of population.—The total land area of the state is 66,836 square miles. The average number of inhabitants to the square mile in 1920 is 20.3 (see Table 1), as against 17.1 in 1910 and 7.8 in 1900.

Minor civil divisions.—The political units into which the counties are divided are collectively termed "minor civil divisions." The 39 counties of Washington are made up of 1,563 primary divisions, comprising

1,461 election precincts, 82 townships, 8 cities, and 12 towns. Population figures are presented for these primary divisions so far as reported separately, but 1 township (8 N., R. 3 E., in Cowlitz County), for which no population was returned, does not appear in the table. There are also 190 secondary divisions, comprising 61 cities and 129 towns. Each of 35 cities and 38 towns is coextensive with the election precinct in which located, and each of 17 cities and 29 towns comprises 2 or more precincts or parts of precincts. Besides these primary and secondary divisions there are 15 Indian reservations, 1 navy yard, 1 national park, and a tract of unsurveyed land, not located in any precinct or township, for which population is returned. The Indian reservations, though independent of the county organizations, have been

considered, for census purposes, as forming parts of the counties in which they are located. (See Table 2.)

Cities.—Washington has 69 cities, of which Seattle, with a population of 315,312, is the largest. Spokane, with 104,437, and Tacoma, with 96,965, are the only remaining cities having more than 50,000 inhabitants.

The following summary shows, for each city having 15,000 or more inhabitants in 1920, the population at each census for which figures are available, together with the number and per cent of increase during the preceding decade:

Urban and rural population.—The Census Bureau defines urban population as that residing in cities and other incorporated places having 2,500 inhabitants or more, and rural population as that residing outside such incorporated places.

The following summary presents, for the last three censuses, figures showing the urban and rural population of the state distributed among places grouped according to specified limits of population. The classification for each census is based upon the population

of the various places as shown by the returns of that census. Consequently the territory comprised within any one class of cities or that designated as urban or as rural does not remain fixed, because any given place may, through the growth or the decline of its population, pass from one class to another at successive censuses. The proportion of the population of Washington living in places of 2,500 or more increased from 40.8 per cent in 1900 to 53 per cent in 1910 and to 55.2 per cent in 1920.

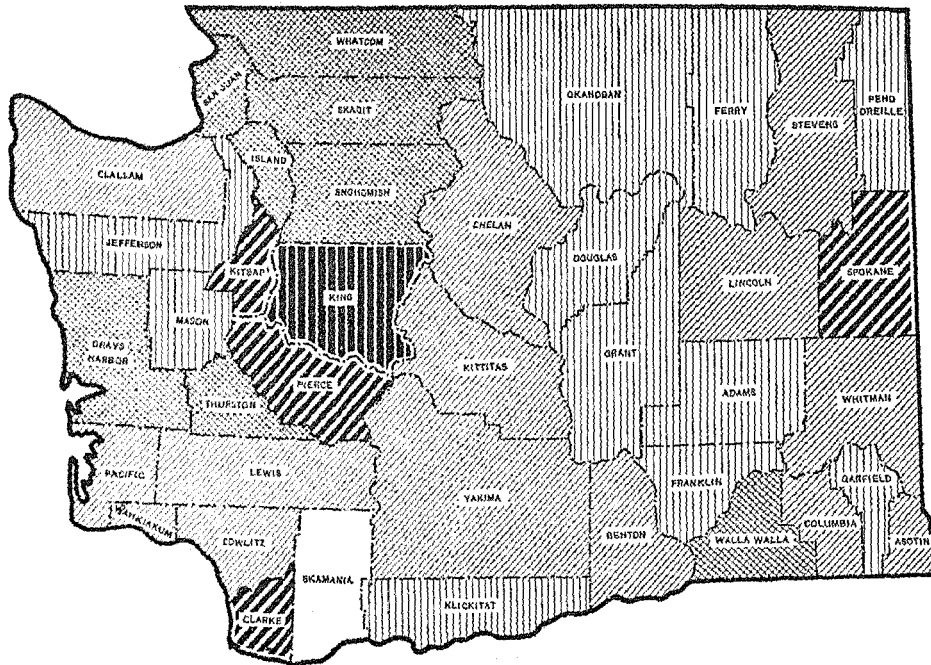

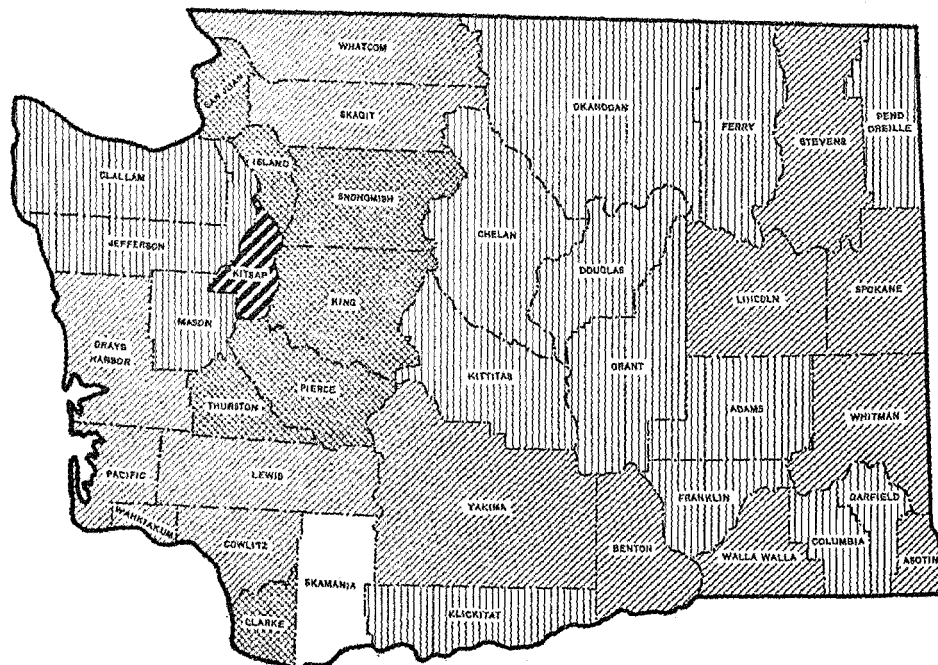
# DENSITY OF POPULATION OF WASHINGTON, BY COUNTIES: 1920.

Rural population is defined as that residing outside of incorporated places having 2,500 inhabitants or more.

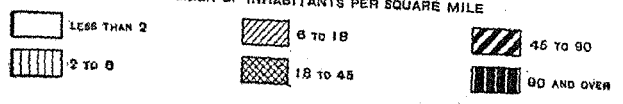
## TOTAL POPULATION.

### 1 CHANGES IN BOUNDARIES, ETC.

THE STATE.—State total for 1890 includes population (7,842) of Indian reservations specially enumerated in 1890, not distributed by counties.

- ADAMS.—Organized from part of Whitman in 1883.
- ASOTIN.—Organized from part of Garfield in 1883.
- BENTON.—Organized from parts of Klickitat and Yakima in 1905.
- CHELAN.—Organized from parts of Kittitas and Okanogan in 1899.
- COLUMBIA.—Organized from part of Walla Walla in 1875; part taken to form Garfield in 1881.
- DOUGLAS.—Organized from part of Lincoln in 1883; part taken to form Grant in 1909.
- FERRY.—Organized from part of Stevens in 1899.
- FRANKLIN.—Organized from part of Whitman in 1883.
- GARFIELD.—Organized from part of Columbia in 1881; part taken to form Asotin in 1883.
- GRANT.—Organized from part of Douglas in 1909.
- GRAYS HARBOR.—Name changed from Chehalis in 1915.
- ISLAND.—Part taken to form Snohomish in 1866.
- KITTITAS.—Organized from part of Yakima in 1883; part taken to form part of Chelan in 1899.

- KLICKITAT.—Part taken to form part of Benton in 1905.
- LINCOLN.—Organized from part of Spokane in 1883; part taken to form Douglas in 1883.
- MASON.—Name changed from Sawamish in 1864.
- OKANOGAN.—Organized from part of Stevens in 1883; part taken to form part of Chelan in 1899.
- PEND OREILLE.—Organized from part of Stevens in 1911.
- SAN JUAN.—Formed from the "Disputed Islands" in 1873.
- SKAGIT.—Organized from part of Whatcom in 1883.
- SNOHOMISH.—Organized from part of Island in 1866.
- SPOKANE.—Returned separately in 1860; returned as a part of Stevens in 1870; organized from part of Stevens in 1879; part taken to form Lincoln in 1883.
- STEVENS.—Parts taken to form Spokane in 1879, Okanogan in 1883, Ferry in 1899, and Pend Oreille in 1911.
- WALLA WALLA.—Parts taken to form Whitman in 1871 and Columbia in 1875.
- WHATCOM.—Part taken to form Skagit in 1883.
- WHITMAN.—Organized from part of Walla Walla in 1871; parts taken to form Adams and Franklin in 1883.
- YAKIMA.—Parts taken to form Kittitas in 1883 and part of Benton in 1905.

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#### TOTAL POPULATION, INCREASE, AND DISTRIBUTION.

**Population of the state.**—West Virginia, originally a part of Virginia, was admitted to the Union as the thirty-fifth state in June, 1863. According to the Fourteenth Census, taken as of January 1, 1920, its population is 1,463,701, which represents an increase of 242,582, or 19.9 per cent, over the 1910 figure. During the same period the population of the United States increased by 14.9 per cent.

The following summary shows the population of

West Virginia from 1870 to 1920, inclusive, together with the number and per cent of increase for each decade, in comparison with the per cent of increase for the United States as a whole. The population, at censuses prior to 1870, of that part of Virginia which was later taken to form West Virginia was as follows: 1860, 376,688; 1850, 302,313; 1840, 224,537; 1830, 176,924; 1820, 136,808; 1810, 105,469; 1800, 78,592; 1790, 55,873.

**Counties.**—West Virginia has 55 counties, of which 40 show increases and 15 decreases as compared with 1910. (See Table 1.) There have been no changes in county boundaries during the last decade.

**Density of population.**—The total land area of the state is 24,022 square miles. The average number of inhabitants to the square mile in 1920 is 60.9 (see Table 1), as against 50.8 in 1910 and 39.9 in 1900.

**Minor civil divisions.**—The political units into which the counties are divided are collectively termed "minor civil divisions." The 55 counties of West Virginia are made up of 350 magisterial districts, for which the population is presented so far as reported separately. There are also 201 secondary divisions, comprising 34 cities, 156 towns, and 11 villages. Each of two cities

comprises one or more magisterial districts and parts of others, and three cities are coextensive with the districts in which located. (See Table 2.)

**Cities.**—West Virginia has 34 cities, of which Wheeling, with a population of 56,208, is the largest. Huntington, with 59,177, is the only other city having more than 50,000 inhabitants; and Charleston, with 39,608, and Clarksburg, with 27,869, are the only cities which have between 25,000 and 50,000 inhabitants. (See Tables 3 and 4.)

The summary on the following page shows, for the 10 West Virginia cities having 10,000 or more inhabitants in 1920, the population at each census for which figures are available, together with the number and per cent of increase during the preceding decade.

**Urban and rural population.**—The Census Bureau defines urban population as that residing in cities and other incorporated places having 2,500 inhabitants or more, and rural population as that residing outside such incorporated places.

The following summary presents, for the last three censuses, figures showing the urban and rural population of the state distributed among places grouped according to specified limits of population. The classification for each census is based upon the population

of the various places as shown by the returns of that census. Consequently the territory comprised within any one class of cities or that designated as urban or as rural does not remain fixed, because any given place may, through the growth or the decline of its population, pass from one class to another at successive censuses. The proportion of the population of West Virginia living in places of 2,500 or more increased from 13.1 per cent in 1900 to 18.7 per cent in 1910 and to 25.2 per cent in 1920.

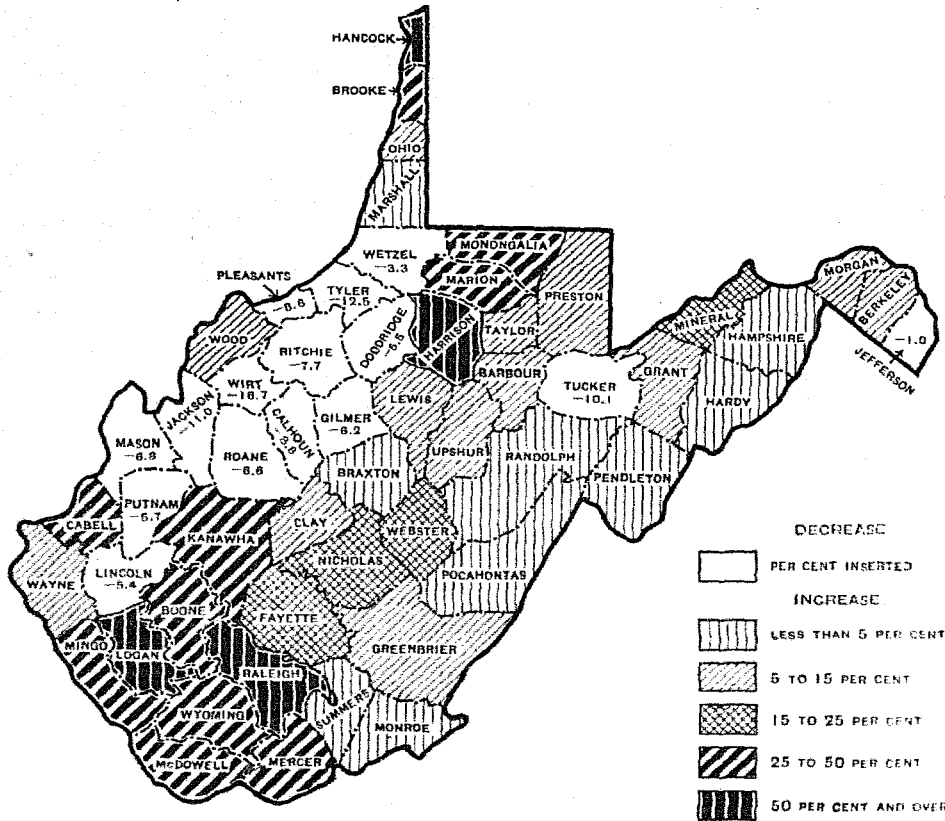

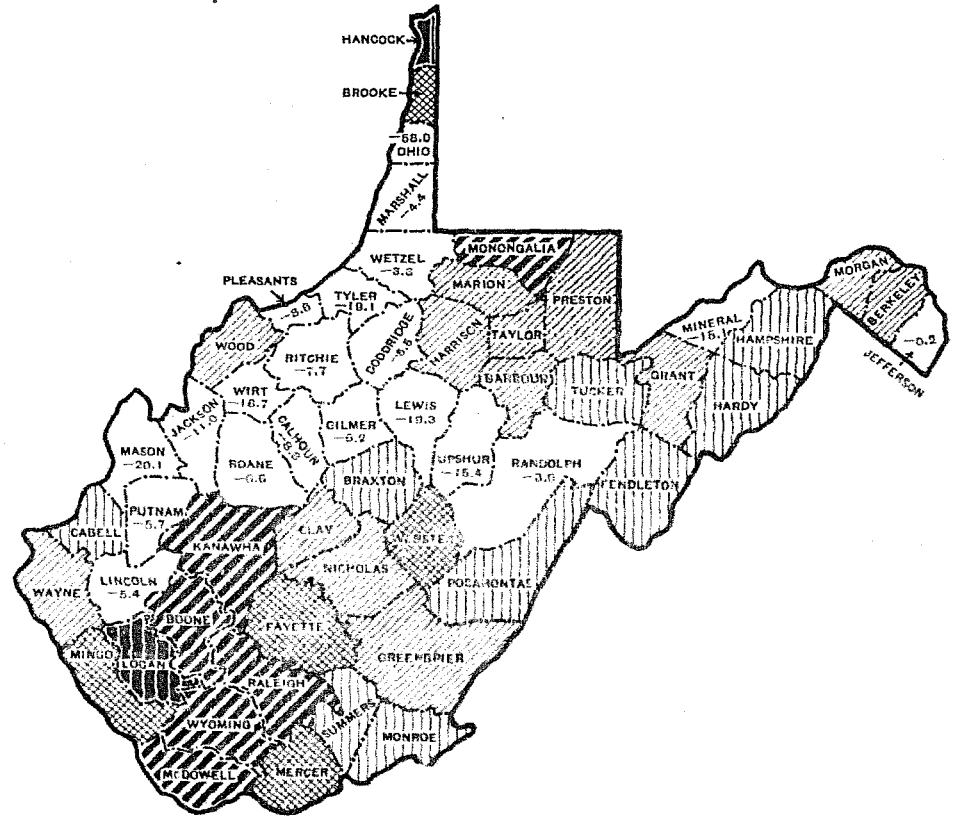
PER CENT OF INCREASE OR DECREASE OF POPULATION OF WEST VIRGINIA, BY COUNTIES: 1910-1920.

TOTAL POPULATION.



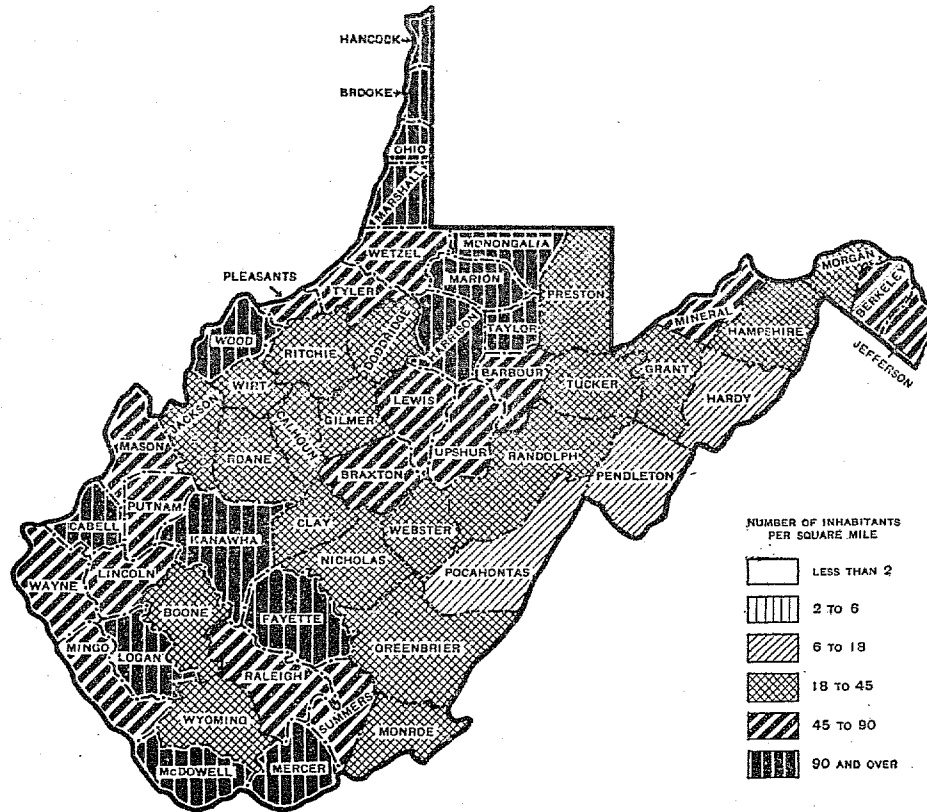
RURAL POPULATION.



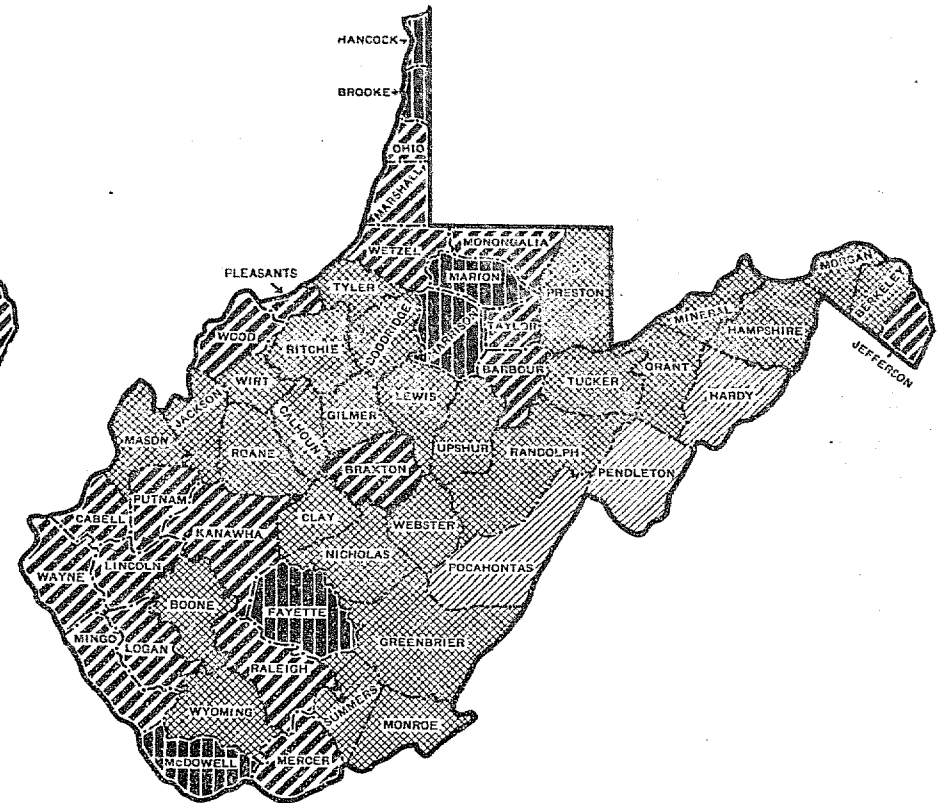
### DENSITY OF POPULATION OF WEST VIRGINIA, BY COUNTIES: 1920.

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#### TOTAL POPULATION, INCREASE, AND DISTRIBUTION.

**Population of the state.**—The area now constituting the states of Wisconsin, Iowa, Minnesota, and portions of North and South Dakota was organized as the territory of Wisconsin in 1836. The territory of Iowa was organized in 1838 from the portion lying west of the Mississippi, leaving what are now the eastern and northeastern portions of Minnesota still included in the territory of Wisconsin. In May, 1848, Wisconsin, with boundaries as at present, was admitted to the Union as the thirtieth state. According

to the Fourteenth Census, taken as of January 1, 1920, its population is 2,632,067, which represents an increase of 298,207, or 12.8 per cent, since 1910. During the same period the population of the United States increased by 14.9 per cent.

The following summary shows the population of Wisconsin from 1840 to 1920, inclusive, together with the number and per cent of increase for each decade, in comparison with the per cent of increase for the United States as a whole:

**Counties.**—Wisconsin has 71 counties, of which 54 show increases and 17 decreases as compared with 1910. (See Table 1.)

**Density of population.**—The total land area of the state is 55,256 square miles. The average number of inhabitants to the square mile in 1920 is 47.6 (see Table 1), as against 42.2 in 1910 and 37.4 in 1900.

**Minor civil divisions.**—The political units into which the counties are divided are collectively termed "minor civil divisions." The counties of Wisconsin are made up of 1,704 primary divisions, comprising 132 cities, 324 incorporated villages, and 1,248 rural towns. There is also one secondary division, the village of Avoca, in Pulaski town, Iowa County. Four Indian res-

ervations, which are independent of the county organizations, are located within the state. (See Table 2.)

Cities.—Wisconsin has 132 cities, of which Milwaukee, with a population of 457,147, is the largest. (See Tables 3 and 4.)

The following summary shows, for each city having 25,000 or more inhabitants in 1920, the population at each census for which figures are available, together with the number and per cent of increase during the preceding decade:

Urban and rural population.—The Census Bureau defines urban population as that residing in cities and other incorporated places having 2,500 inhabitants or more, and rural population as that residing outside such incorporated places.

The following summary presents, for the last three censuses, figures showing the urban and rural population of the state distributed among places grouped according to specified limits of population. The classification for each census is based upon the population

of the various places as shown by the returns of that census. Consequently the territory comprised within any one class of cities or that designated as urban or as rural does not remain fixed, because any given place may, through the growth or the decline of its population, pass from one class to another at successive censuses. The proportion of the population of Wisconsin living in places of 2,500 or more increased from 38.2 per cent in 1900 to 43 per cent in 1910 and to 47.3 per cent in 1920.

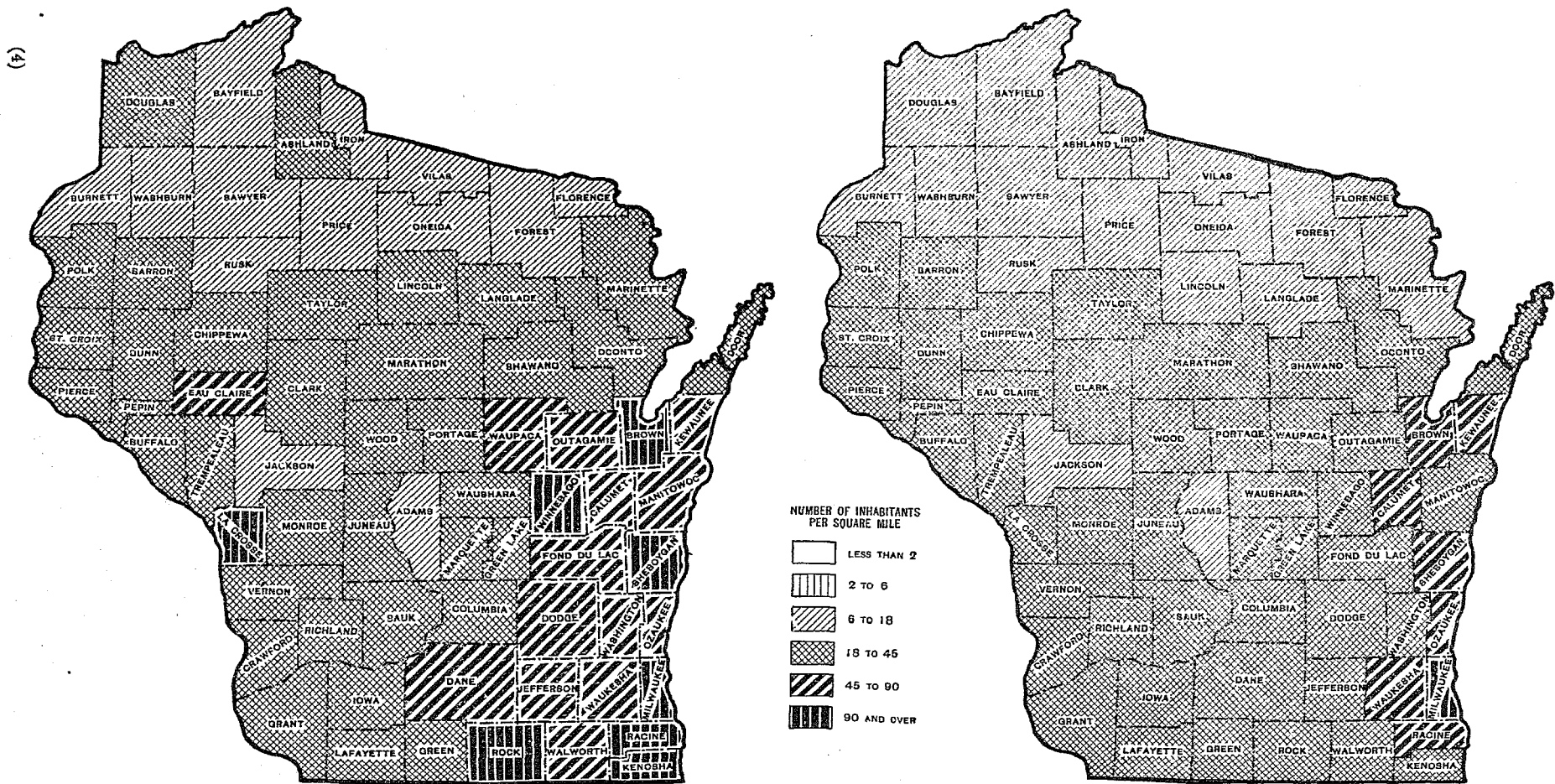


## DENSITY OF POPULATION OF WISCONSIN, BY COUNTIES: 1920.

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TOTAL POPULATION, INCREASE, AND DISTRIBUTION.

Population of the state.—Wyoming was organized as a territory in 1868 and was admitted to the Union as the forty-fourth state in 1890. According to the Fourteenth Census, taken as of January 1, 1920, its population is 194,402, which represents an increase of 48,437, or 33.2 per cent, over the 1910 figure.

During the same period the population of the United States increased by 14.9 per cent. The following summary shows the population of Wyoming from 1870 to 1920, inclusive, together with the number and per cent of increase for each decade, in comparison with the per cent of increase for the United States as a whole:

Counties.—Wyoming has 21 counties, of which 7 have been organized since 1910. Yellowstone National Park, the greater part of which is located in the state, is independent of any county organization. (See Table 1.) The organization of the 7 new counties between 1910 and 1920 involved changes in the area of 8 others. It has been necessary, therefore, in preparing the maps on page 3, showing rates of increase or decrease in total and rural population, by counties, to make the following combinations: Campbell with Crook and Weston; Goshen and Platte with Laramie; Hot Springs and Washakie with Big Horn, Fremont, and Park; Lincoln with Uinta; Niobrara with Converse.

Density of population.—The total land area of the state is 97,548 square miles. The average number

of inhabitants to the square mile in 1920 is 2 (see Table 1), as against 1.5 in 1910 and 0.9 in 1900.

Minor civil divisions.—The political units into which the counties are divided are collectively termed "minor civil divisions." The primary divisions of the counties of Wyoming are the election districts, which number 349. There are also 73 secondary divisions, comprising 10 cities, 62 towns, and 1 village. Three cities and 27 towns are coextensive with the election districts in which located, and 3 other cities and 1 town comprise 2 or more districts each. Besides these minor civil divisions, there is one Indian reservation, which, although independent of any county organization, is returned as a part of the county in which located. (See Table 2.)

## POPULATION—WYOMING.

Cities.—Wyoming has 10 cities, of which Cheyenne, with a population of 13,829, is the largest. (See Tables 3 and 4.)

The following summary shows, for each city having

5,000 or more inhabitants in 1920, the population at each census for which figures are available, together with the number and per cent of increase during the preceding decade:

Urban and rural population.—The Census Bureau defines urban population as that residing in cities and other incorporated places having 2,500 inhabitants or more, and rural population as that residing outside such incorporated places.

The following summary presents, for the last three censuses, figures showing the urban and rural population of the state distributed among places grouped according to specified limits of population. The classification for each census is based upon the population

of the various places as shown by the returns of that census. Consequently the territory comprised within any one class of cities or that designated as urban or as rural does not remain fixed, because any given place may, through the growth or the decline of its population, pass from one class to another at successive censuses. The proportion of the population of Wyoming living in places of 2,500 or more increased from 28.8 per cent in 1900 to 29.6 per cent in 1910 and decreased to 29.5 per cent in 1920.

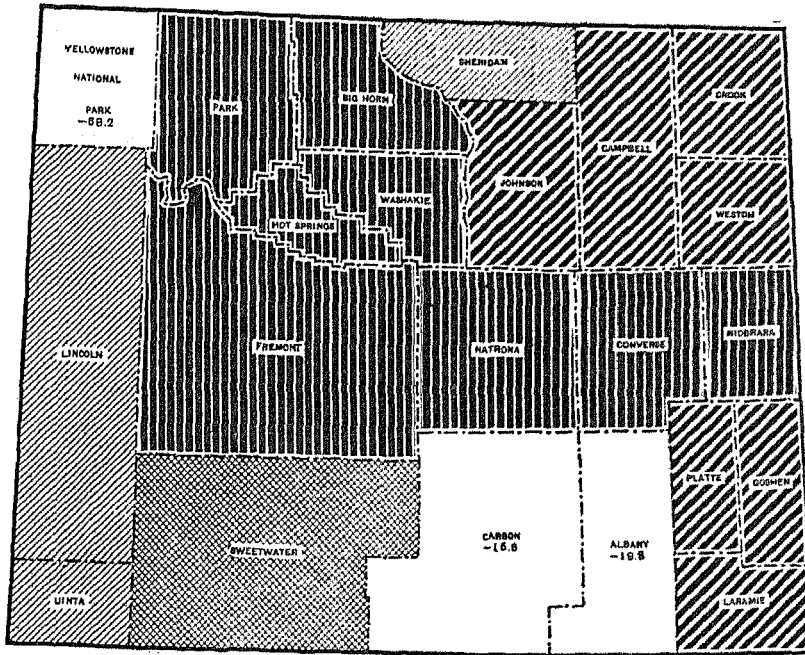

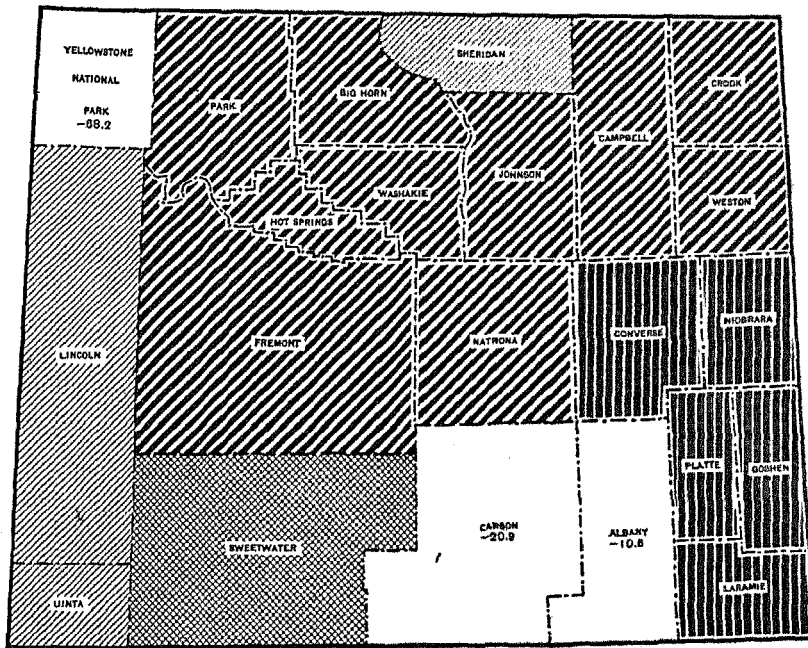
PER CENT OF INCREASE OR DECREASE OF POPULATION OF WYOMING, BY COUNTIES: 1910-1920.

TOTAL POPULATION.



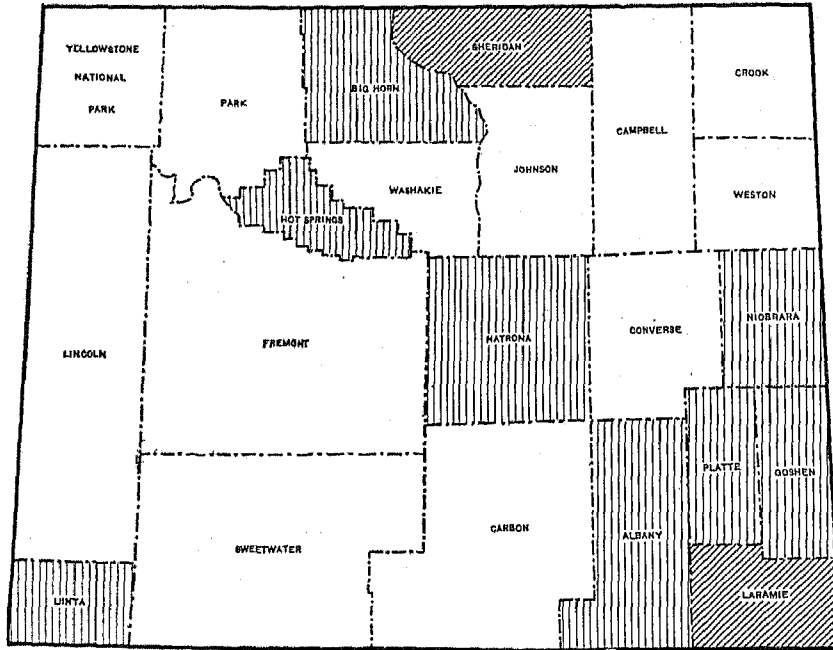

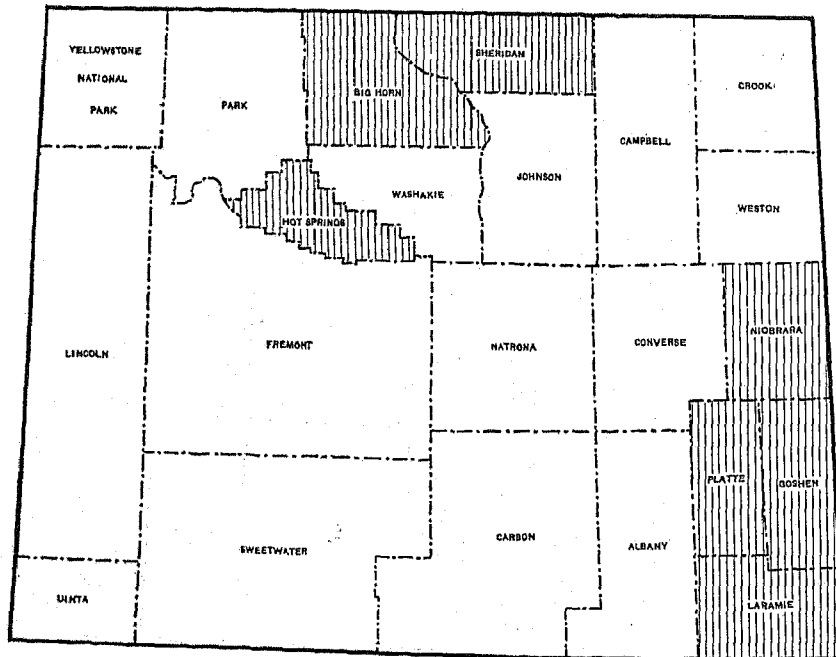
# DENSITY OF POPULATION OF WYOMING, BY COUNTIES: 1920.

Rural population is defined as that residing outside of incorporated places having 2,500 inhabitants or more.

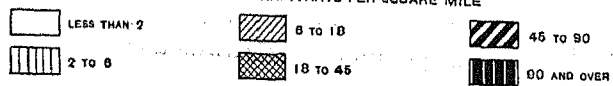

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TOTAL POPULATION, INCREASE, AND DISTRIBUTION.

Population of the territory.—Alaska was purchased by the United States from the Russian government in March, 1867. The first enumeration of its population by the United States was made in 1880 and consisted of a canvass of all accessible settlements, supplemented by estimates—based mainly upon records or upon the personal knowledge of missionary priests—for those regions which could not be visited by the canvassers. A similar practice was followed in 1890, but the area actually canvassed in that year was larger than that

visited in 1880, and at each subsequent census the enumerations have been more nearly complete and accurate.

According to the Fourteenth Census, taken as of January 1, 1920, the population of Alaska is 54,899, which represents a decrease of 9,457, or 14.7 per cent, since 1910. The following summary shows the population of Alaska from 1880 to 1920, inclusive, together with the number and per cent of increase or decrease for each decade:

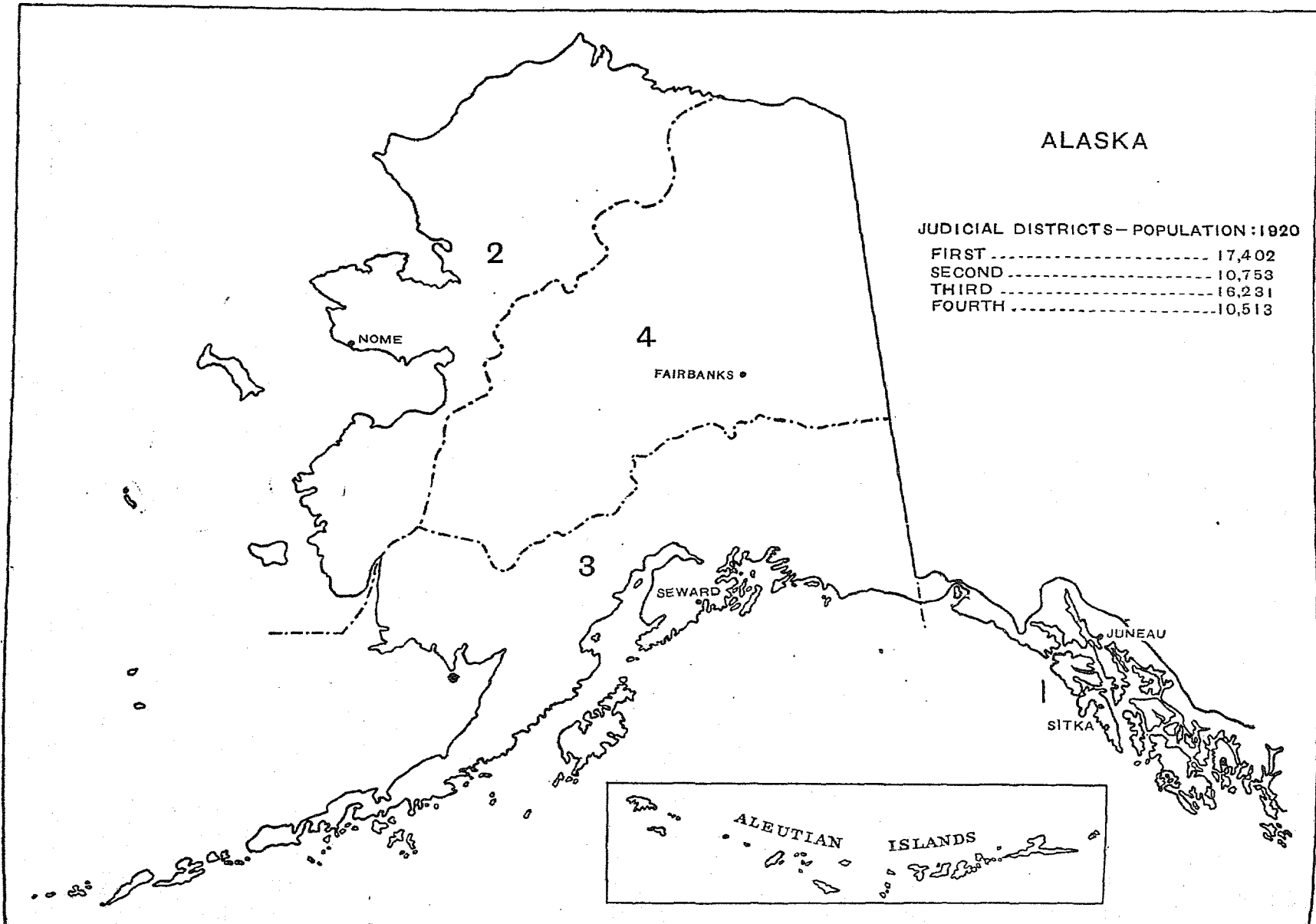

Density of population.—The gross land and water area of Alaska is 590,884 square miles, which is nearly equal to one-fifth of the gross area of the United States, exclusive of outlying possessions (3,026,789 square miles), and slightly exceeds the combined area of the three Pacific Coast states—Washington, Oregon, and California—and Texas. Based upon gross area, the density of population, or number of inhabitants per square mile of territory, in Alaska is less than one-tenth of 1 in 1920, as against slightly more than one-tenth of 1 in 1910. The density in 1920 is equivalent to an average area of 10.8 square miles, or 6,888 acres, to each inhabitant. For the United States, exclusive of outlying possessions, the average number of persons per square mile in 1920 is 34.9, while the average area to each inhabitant is 18.3 acres.

Judicial districts and minor civil divisions.—By the act of March 3, 1909, Alaska was divided into four judicial districts, which are outlined on the map on page 2. The political units into which the judicial districts are divided are collectively termed "minor civil divisions." Of these, the recorders' districts, 52 in number, constitute the primary divisions (see Table 1), while the secondary divisions, which number 184, comprise 17 incorporated towns, 151 unincorporated villages, 5 unincorporated towns, 5 forts, 4 islands, and 2 stations (see Table 2). In Table 1 comparative figures are given for 1910 only, since the population of the judicial and recorders' districts can not generally be accurately determined from the census reports for earlier years. In Table 2 comparative figures for both 1910 and 1900 are given for all places for which such figures are available.

POPULATION : CANAL ZONE

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INTRODUCTION.

This bulletin gives the results of the census of the Canal Zone, which was taken by the Governor of The Panama Canal as of January 1, 1920, in accordance with plans prescribed by the Director of the Census, as required by the act of Congress approved March 3, 1919, providing for the Fourteenth and subsequent decennial censuses of the United States.

**Acquisition.**—The United States acquired sovereignty over the territory now comprising the Canal Zone by a treaty of November 18, 1903, concluded with the Republic of Panama, which was formerly a department of the Republic of Colombia. By this treaty Panama granted to the United States "in perpetuity the use, occupation, and control of a zone of land and land under water" of the width of 10 miles for "the construction, maintenance, operation, sanitation, and protection" of a ship canal across the Isthmus of Panama. The cities and harbors of Panama and Colon were expressly excluded from this grant, but the United States was given authority to prescribe and enforce sanitary ordinances in these cities and under extraordinary circumstances to maintain public order there. Compensation to Panama in the form of a lump-sum payment and an annual rental, payable beginning nine years after the exchange of ratification, was provided for. The treaty was ratified on February 26, 1904.

**Area.**—The extent of the Canal Zone was defined in the treaty of November 13, 1903, with Panama as follows:

The Republic of Panama grants to the United States in perpetuity the use, occupation, and control of a zone of land and land under water \* \* \* of the width of ten miles extending to the distance of five miles on each side of the center line of the route of the canal to be constructed; the said zone beginning in the Caribbean Sea three marine miles from mean low water mark and extend-

ing to and across the Isthmus of Panama into the Pacific Ocean to a distance of three marine miles from mean low water mark with the proviso that the cities of Panama and Colon and the harbors adjacent to said cities, which are included within the boundaries of the zone above described, shall not be included within this grant.

The grant further included "all islands within the limits of the zone above described and in addition thereto the group of small islands in the Bay of Panama, named Perico, Naos, Culebra, and Flamenco."

The Republic of Panama further granted "in perpetuity the use, occupation, and control of any other lands and waters outside of the zone above described which may be necessary and convenient for the construction, maintenance, operation, sanitation, and protection of the said canal or of any auxiliary canals or other works necessary and convenient for the construction, maintenance, operation, sanitation, and protection of the said enterprise."

Under the provisions of the treaty the United States subsequent to a decree from Panama of May 17, 1912, took over the islands in Lake Gatun, the shores of the lake up to an elevation of 100 feet above mean sea level, and the peninsulas bordering on it to which there is no access except from the lake or from land in the Canal Zone. The boundaries of this area were established in a convention of September 2, 1914, ratified in 1915, between the United States and Panama. This convention also effected a readjustment of boundaries, mainly by the exchange of lands adjoining the city of Panama for certain harbor areas in the city of Colon needed to bring within the Canal Zone all the terminal construction along the mole and all the water area in front of Toro Point in Limon Bay in the lee of the breakwater.



The present area of the Canal Zone, including land and water, within the limits of 5 miles on either side of the center line of the canal but not including the area within the 3-mile limit from the Atlantic and Pacific ends, is 441.5 square miles. The land area of the 10-mile strip is 332.4 square miles. The areas outside the original 5-mile limits which are under the control of the United States Government are officially

designated as auxiliary areas of the Canal Zone and include, in addition to portions of Gatun Lake and its shores, several small areas taken over for canal or military purposes. The area of the portions of Gatun Lake outside the original 10-mile strip is 61 square miles, but a detailed survey of the entire area bordering the lake has not been made.<sup>1</sup>

#### NUMBER OF INHABITANTS.

**Censuses of population.**—In 1904, the year in which the United States took over control of the Canal Zone, a census was taken by order of the newly appointed Isthmian Canal Commission. In 1906, between March 8 and 10, a census of towns in the Canal Zone was taken by the Sanitary Department, showing the number of "whites," "blacks," and "yellows"; and it was stated that an addition of 5 or 10 per cent should be made for persons living in outlying districts who were indirectly connected with canal work. Between March 3 and June 23, 1908, a census of population was taken by the Canal Commission of the towns, villages, and labor camps adjoining the Panama Railroad, and the totals for this were added to the results of a census of rural districts taken in July, 1907. These returns showed data for towns according to race and sex, and a distribution according to nationality for the total number enumerated, with the number of employees of the Canal Commission and the Panama Railroad, besides the number of single and married men and women, respectively, and the number of children, by sex, for white persons from the United States.

In 1912 a complete and detailed enumeration was made of all the inhabitants of the Canal Zone, which comprised the military and naval population and included also figures for employees of the Isthmian Canal Commission and the Panama Railroad living outside the Canal Zone proper at Canal Commission settlements. In addition all employees of the Isthmian Canal Commission and the Panama Railroad who were employed in the Canal Zone but resided in the cities of Panama or Colon were enumerated, but were not included in the total for the Canal Zone.

At the census of 1912, which was the only enumeration prior to 1920 giving details as to the characteristics of the population, the data shown comprised for each town and the rural part of each administrative district figures as to sex, color or race, and broad age groups, as well as the number of employees of the Canal Commission or the Panama Railroad and the number of other persons gainfully employed, the latter being shown by broad occupation classes. For the total population of the Canal Zone data were

given as to country of birth (for persons born in the United States also the state of birth), citizenship, number single or married among those born in the United States, illiteracy, and number, according to birthplace, whose first residence in the zone dated from a period before the ratification of the first treaty with Panama.

Under a presidential order of December 5, 1912, referred to as the depopulation order, the chairman of the Canal Commission was authorized to take possession in behalf of the United States of all land in the Canal Zone. As the work of depopulating the zone progressed, the inhabitants who were not in the employ of the United States either removed to the terminal cities or left the Isthmus altogether. During the fiscal year 1913-14 house-to-house canvasses of the population were made by the police at frequent intervals, but figures for only two of these enumerations are available. In December, 1914, and July, 1915, censuses were also taken by the police, since which time there has been an annual police census near the end of the fiscal year.

The census of 1920, which is the first census of the Canal Zone taken under the supervision of the Bureau of the Census, presents details as to sex, race or color, nativity, parentage, age, marital condition, and illiteracy for the total population and for the civilian and the military and naval population separately. Separate figures for the two population groups are given as regards school attendance and inability to speak English. Data as to occupations are presented for the civilian population.

**Population changes.**—Table 1, on the next page, shows the population of the Canal Zone as returned at successive enumerations made since the United States took over the control of the territory. At the police censuses, and probably at the early censuses, the methods of enumeration differed from that followed at the Federal census of 1920, and therefore only the most general comparisons can be made of the figures given in this table.

The population of the Panama Canal Zone may be said to have been created or called into existence by the construction of the Panama Canal, and the growth and decline of the population have been mainly determined by the labor requirements for that work.

In 1904, when the United States first assumed control of the strip of land 10 miles wide extending from ocean to ocean across the Isthmus and constituting the Canal Zone, the territory contained a population of less than 10,000 people. Eight years later, as shown by the census of 1912, the population had increased to over 60,000, the increase, of course, consisting mainly of laborers who had come to the zone from other parts of the world to work on the canal. Since that census there has been a general decrease in the civilian population, with the exception of slight increases shown by the police censuses of June, 1917, and August, 1919. The population shown at the police census of 1919 was much larger than the figure for the Federal census of January 1, 1920, the difference representing largely transients and workers temporarily residing in the Canal Zone but permanently domiciled in the Republic of Panama. A large part of the decrease in population since 1912 is due to the Executive order of December 5, 1912, previously mentioned, which resulted in the depopulation of the

Canal Zone of native landowners and squatters; but obviously another important factor is the reduction of the force of employees consequent upon the completion of the construction work on the canal. The census of 1912 was taken at a time when the force employed was nearing its maximum, the greatest working force (including contractors' forces) ever reported being 44,733 on March 26, 1913. It should be noted that employees living in the cities of Panama and Colon, which are outside the Canal Zone, are not included in the census figures presented in this bulletin.

The readjustment of boundaries in 1915 did not materially affect comparisons of the total population, as the number of persons in the section taken from the Canal Zone did not differ greatly from the number in the added area.

The population of the Canal Zone is still largely a transient one, fluctuating according to the amount of work involved in the maintenance and operation of the canal and in providing for the needs of canal and railroad employees.

On the basis of a land area of 333 square miles, representing the original 10-mile zone, the density of the population (including military and naval) in 1920 was 68.6 persons per square mile.

In Table 2, for purposes of comparison, the population as reported at the census of February, 1912, has been distributed according to areas conforming as nearly as possible to those shown for 1920; corresponding figures from the police census of June, 1916, have been included.

It should be noted that the figures for 1916 probably include some classes not covered by the Federal census of 1920 or the earlier census taken by the Canal Zone authorities.

COMPOSITION AND CHARACTERISTICS OF THE POPULATION.

COLOR OR RACE, NATIVITY, AND PARENTAGE CLASSES.

Color or race, nativity, and parentage.—Of the civilian population of the Canal Zone, 42.9 per cent are white and 56.8 per cent Negro, the remainder (0.3 per cent) being Chinese. The military and naval population is 95.2 per cent white.

All persons born in the United States or any of its possessions are classed as native. The native population of the Canal Zone, as thus defined, comprises the native white, practically all of whom were born in the United States or are children of persons born in the United States, and the native colored, most of whom were born in the Canal Zone. After the President's order of depopulation, as already stated, those natives of the Canal Zone who were not in the employ of the United States moved to the terminal cities or other places outside the zone. The majority of the foreign-born Negroes are natives of the British West Indies,

most of them being from Jamaica or the Barbados. The "other colored" in 1920 comprised in the case of the civilian population 46 Chinese and in the case of the military and naval population 10 Filipinos, 2 Chinese, and 1 Japanese.

The native whites form 47 per cent of the total population of the Canal Zone and 86.9 per cent of the total white population. In the civilian population the native whites constitute a lower percentage (37.1) of the total population, but about the same proportion (86.4 per cent) of the total white population.

In the Balboa district, which comprises the Pacific terminal of the canal and the headquarters of the Government and of The Panama Canal and the Panama Railroad, about one-half (50.4 per cent) of the civilian population of 11,547 are white. (See Table 4.) All of the remainder, with the exception of 29 Chinese, are Negroes. In the Cristobal district, on the other hand, which includes the Atlantic terminal of the canal, only 29.4 per cent of the 6,417 persons in the civilian population are white, 70.3 per cent being Negroes.

Sex ratios.—The ratio of males to females in the civilian population of the Canal Zone in 1920 was 134.5 per 100, as compared with 106 per 100 in continental United States in 1910. In the case of the native Negroes, the only strictly indigenous element, the ratio of males to 100 females was 101. This compares with 98.9 for Negroes in the United States in 1910. For the several classes of whites in the civilian population of the Canal Zone the ratio of males to

100 females ranged from 119.9 for the foreign-born whites to 136.4 for the native whites of foreign or mixed parentage. As explaining the excess of males in the native white population, it may be noted that very few of the native whites were born in the Canal Zone. Most of them are natives of the states, who came to the zone attracted by the opportunities for employment.

In the military and naval population there were from about eight to eleven times as many males as females in each class of the white population. The colored elements were unimportant numerically.

Comparison with 1912.—It will be noted by reference to Table 5 that the excess of males in the population of the Canal Zone is much smaller now than it was in 1912, when the construction work on the canal was at its height. At that time the ratio of males to females was 256 to 100. Even at the present time the males in the white population outnumber the females by more than two to one, which is of course a condition very far from normal.

The percentage of colored in the total population of the Canal Zone, as shown by the above table, declined from 69.1 in 1912 to 45.9 in 1920.

COUNTRY OF BIRTH OF THE FOREIGN BORN.

In Table 6 the foreign-born civilian population in 1920 is distributed by country of birth, figures being given for the white and colored of each sex.

Four-fifths of the foreign-born colored in the civilian population are West Indians, three-fourths being from the British West Indies. It is probable that a large proportion of the natives of Panama reported are children of West Indians. Various countries contributed to the foreign white population, but more than one-third of the total number are from English-speaking countries.

AGE AND MARITAL CONDITION.

Age.—A large proportion of the civilian inhabitants of the Canal Zone are in the most active period of adult life, the percentage from 25 to 44 years of age in 1920 being 44.5, whereas in the United States, according to the census of 1910, only about 29 per cent of the population fall within that age period (see Table 8). The percentage 45 years of age and over in the Canal Zone is but 9.9, as compared with 18.9 in the United States; and the percentage of old people, 65 years of age and over, is but 0.5, as compared with 4.3 in the United States.

The percentage of children under 10 years of age in the Canal Zone, 26, is larger than in the United States, where it is 22.2; but the percentage of the population from 10 to 24 years of age is relatively small, being only 18.1, as compared with 29.6 in the United States. It may be said, therefore, that while there is a fairly large number of young children and infants in the civilian population of the Canal Zone, there are comparatively few older children or young people. The explanation may be found in the fact that the large population that immigrated to the Canal Zone from the United States or other countries something more than 10 years ago probably included comparatively few infants and young children, who would now be in the period of

youth. But, on the other hand, the birth rate in the Canal Zone is comparatively high, so that the number of children born since their parents came there is relatively large.<sup>1</sup>

In the civilian population of the Canal Zone the much higher proportion under 15 years of age in the case of females as compared with males is due to the fact that there is a great excess of males among adults, whereas among the children, as in a normal population, the sexes tend to approach numerical equality. The per cent 45 years of age and over was 12 for males and 7.1 for females in the civilian population.

The above statements refer to the civilian population of the Canal Zone. The military and naval population consists mainly of adults who have not reached the period of middle life, only 5.1 per cent of the total being children under 15 years of age, and only 3.8 per cent being 45 years of age and over.

Color or race, nativity, and age.—The Negro civilian population of the Canal Zone includes a much larger proportion of young children than the white, as well as a larger actual number, 3,184, or 31.2 per cent, of the Negroes being under 10 years of age, as compared with 1,495, or 19.4 per cent, of the white population; and while the total number of Negroes exceeds the total

<sup>1</sup> The birth rate of the civilian population in the fiscal year 1919 was 31.14 per 1,000. In 1918 the rate was 31.07; in 1917, 19.61; and in 1916, 20.61. The rates for the last two years are higher than those for the registration states of the United States for the calendar years 1917 and 1918, which are, respectively, 21.6 and 24.4. The infant mortality or number of deaths of infants under 1 year per 1,000 births in the Canal Zone was 84.1 in 1919 (fiscal year), 116 in 1918, 136 in 1917, and 170 in 1916. Thus there appears to have been a steady decline in this rate, which now compares favorably with recent rates available for the United States and most other countries.

number of whites by nearly one-third, more whites than Negroes were reported in each age group above 35. (See Table 9.)

Of the native Negroes more than nine-tenths are under 15. The majority of these are probably children of the West Indian Negroes, who form the greater part of the labor force employed on the canal.

The age distribution of the native whites differs materially from that of the foreign-born whites. The

foreign-born whites include a much smaller proportion of children and a somewhat larger proportion of persons in the early and middle years of adult life than the native whites, the percentage under 15 for the two classes being, respectively, 8.3 and 29.6 and the percentage 15 to 44 years, respectively, 62.5 and 58.6. The percentage 45 and over was also higher among the foreign-born whites than among the native whites (29.2 as compared with 11.7).

**Broad age groups: 1920 and 1912.**—At the census of 1912 the only age groups distinguished in the published returns were those comprising children under 6 and 6 to 14 years of age and persons 15 years and over. Of the 45,163 males in the Canal Zone population in 1912 (see Table 10), 2,747, or 6.1 per cent, were under 6 years; 2,360, or 5.2 per cent, were from 6 to 14 years; and 40,056, or 88.7 per cent, were 15 years of age and over. The corresponding percentages for the 17,647 females were 15.9, 14.2, and 69.9.

In Table 10 the proportions under 15 years of age among white and colored males and females, respectively, are compared for 1920 and 1912. For both white and colored there has been a very marked increase in the proportion of children under 15 years of age, this change being one which would be expected to accompany the completion of the canal and the

transition from construction work to the more permanent work of operation and maintenance.

**Marital condition.**—In the civilian population of the Canal Zone in 1920, 40.6 per cent, or about two-fifths, of the adult males, or males 15 years of age and over, were single, as compared with 19.2 per cent, or about one-fifth, of the adult females. In almost any country or community the percentage single is larger for males than for females, because males as a rule remain single longer than females, or, in other words, marry at an older age. But the very marked and unusual difference between the sexes as regards the percentage single in the Canal Zone is doubtless due in large measure to excess of males in the total adult civilian population, in which there are 157.4 males to 100 females.

The percentage of single men in the United States, 38.7, according to the census of 1910, is somewhat smaller than it is in the civilian population of the Canal Zone (40.6); but the percentage of single women, on the other hand, is much larger in the United States, being 29.7, as compared with 19.2 in the Canal Zone.

It may be noted from Table 11 that there are 612, or 17.1 per cent, more married men than married women in the civilian population of the Canal Zone, which means probably that there are about that number of married men in the zone whose wives have not

accompanied them but have remained at home either in the United States or in some other country or locality outside the zone. This is a condition which results naturally from the temporary character of the population and the unfavorable climate.

In the military and naval population of the Canal Zone in 1920, as would be expected, a great majority of the adult males were single, nearly seven-eighths (86.1 per cent) of the 4,146 males 15 years of age and over being so reported. Only about one-eighth (12.8 per cent) were married and less than 1 per cent widowed or divorced. Of the 497 adult females in this group less than one-fourth (24.1 per cent) were single, 70 per cent being married and the remainder, with the exception of 1 reported as divorced, being widowed.

As shown by Table 12, the percentage single is much higher among males than among females in every age group of the civilian population, but the contrast is most marked relatively in the age groups "25 to 29 years" and "30 to 34 years," which comprise more than one-third of the adult males and females, the percentage single being, respectively, 55.3 and 35.2 for males and 12.5 and 6.1 for females.

In the male civilian population of the Canal Zone the percentage single is greater for the colored than for the white; in the female population the difference is the other way, the percentage single being in general higher for the white women than for the colored. This may be explained, at least in part, by the fact that the excess of men is considerably larger for the colored race in the zone than for the white, the number of adult males per 100 adult females being 168 for the colored and 146 for the white.

Attention has already been called to the fact that the population of the Canal Zone as compared with that of the United States has a larger percentage of single men and a smaller percentage of single women. The contrast is emphasized when the comparison is made by age groups as presented in Table 14, the difference being very marked in the population above 25 years.

In the census of 1912 returns as to marital condition in the Canal Zone were tabulated only for persons 15 years of age and over born in the United States or its territorial possessions, and all these persons are shown either as "single" or "married." Among the white males 15 years of age and over born in the United States or its outlying territory, 58.9 per cent were reported as single. When compared with this the percentage single for white males (nearly all native) in 1920, as given in Table 14, 34.6, shows a very material reduction, resulting naturally from the fact that the

ratio of males to 100 females has fallen off from 256 in 1912 to 176 in 1920, all of which is indicative of progress towards more normal conditions since the construction work on the canal was at its height. In the case of the female population, the percentage single, as might be expected in view of the continuous excess of males, shows little change, being 19.9 for native white females in 1912 and 20.8 for white females in 1920.

## SCHOOL ATTENDANCE, ILLITERACY, AND INABILITY TO SPEAK ENGLISH.

School attendance.—In 1920, 3,026 persons, or considerably more than two-thirds (71.1 per cent) of the civilian population 5 to 19 years of age, reported that they had attended school at some time during the current school year.

There is little difference apparently either between the sexes or between the white and colored children as regards the percentage attending school, except in the case of the older children 15 to 19 years of age, in which age group the percentage is much higher for the white children (56) than for the colored (12.2). The higher percentage represents largely pupils attending a high school or industrial courses conducted for white children.

The percentages of children attending school in the Canal Zone, as shown in Table 15, do not differ very much from the corresponding percentages for most of the Northern states, as reported in the census of 1910.

For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1919, the net enrollment in the schools, as stated in the annual report of the Governor of The Panama Canal, was 3,006. This is about the same as the number who at the census of 1920 were reported as having attended school for a longer or shorter period at some time between September 1, 1919, and January 1, 1920; but it should be noted that the enrollment figures include some children of canal employees who live outside the Canal Zone and therefore are not covered by the census of 1920.

The following statement giving the average daily attendance and the net enrollment, so far as figures are available, for the white and colored schools separately during the school years 1905 to 1919, is compiled from the reports of the Governor of The Panama

Canal and from a review of the average daily attendance in the Canal Zone public schools contained in The Panama Canal Record of December 17, 1919 (Vol. XIII, p. 240). It shows a general increase in average daily attendance up to 1913, the year when the maximum force was employed on the canal, and fluctuations after that year. Since 1916 there has been a steady increase both in the net enrollment and in the average daily attendance.

The fact that notwithstanding a decrease between 1912 and 1920 of 41.6 per cent in the total number of children under 15 years of age (see Table 10) the average daily school attendance was larger in 1919 than in 1912 indicates considerable improvement in the matter of school attendance or in school facilities.

As the total number of persons between the ages of 5 and 19, inclusive, in the military and naval population of the Canal Zone in 1920 was only 778 and about five-sixths (652) of these were 15 to 19 years of age, most of them being actively engaged in the military or naval service, the figures as to school attendance for this group are not important enough to call for special comment. Of the 126 persons 5 to 14 years of age, 97, or 77 per cent, attended school, and of the 652 persons 15 to 19 years of age, 25, or 3.8 per cent.

Illiteracy.—Table 17 shows the number and per cent illiterate among males and females of each class of the civilian population of the Canal Zone in 1920. All persons unable to write have been classified as illiterate, although some of them may be able to read.

In 1920 only 751 persons, or 5.7 per cent of the civilian population of the Canal Zone 10 years of age and over, were reported as unable to write. No illiterate persons were reported among the native whites, and the percentage illiterate among the foreign-born whites was only 1.9, which is lower than that for the native whites in the United States in 1910 (3). The low percentage for the whites is not surprising, inasmuch as the work on the canal which requires no education is in large measure performed by the "silver force," made up principally of West Indian Negroes, and the white employees are for the most part engaged in work for which the ability to read and write is important.

It will be noted that within each population class which included illiterate persons the percentage of illiteracy is slightly higher for males than for females. This is contrary to the situation in the United States, where for all classes combined and for each individual class except the native whites the percentage for females in 1910 was the higher.

In each age group under 45 the percentage illiterate, as shown in Table 18, is higher among all males than among all females, but in the case of the colored there are slight exceptions.

It is a fact of some significance as indicating the influence of the recently established school system in the Canal Zone that the colored children 10 to 14 years of age are as free from illiteracy as the white children in the same age group. At older ages, and especially above the age of 45, the illiteracy of the colored population is very high, while for the white population cases of illiteracy are but few.

For nearly every age group, as shown by Table 19, the percentage illiterate in the Canal Zone is below that shown for all classes combined in continental United States, although slightly higher than that for the native white alone.

In the military and naval population in 1920, as shown by Table 20, the percentage illiterate was higher among females 10 years of age and over than among males of that group and considerably higher for the colored than for the white.

## OCCUPATIONS.

The occupations of 7,730 residents of the Canal Zone were reported in the present census. The total number of males returned as gainfully employed (7,008) constituted 94.5 per cent of the civilian male

the total population 15 years of age and over, by color, as reported at the censuses of 1920 and 1912; and it will be noted that since 1912, when the construction work on the canal was near its height, there has been a marked reduction in the percentage of illiteracy in the adult population of each class.

**Inability to speak English.**—Of the total civilian population of the Canal Zone, only 490 persons, or 3.7 per cent of those 10 years of age and over, were reported as unable to speak English, 400 of this number being foreign-born Negroes.

The low percentage unable to speak English is due to the fact that the majority of the foreign-born Negroes, as well as a large proportion of the foreign-born whites, came from English-speaking countries. Moreover, the white males employed in the Canal Zone are for the most part engaged in work which requires some education and probably some knowledge of English.

Less than 1 per cent of the military and naval population 10 years of age and over were reported as unable to speak English, such persons comprising 9 of the 4,686 persons of the specified age in this group.

population 15 years of age and over in 1920. Employed females numbered only 722, and constituted but 15.3 per cent of the female population 15 years of age and over.

As the total number of employees of The Panama Canal and Panama Railroad was 22,328<sup>1</sup> on January 7, 1920, it will be seen that the gainfully occupied population of the Canal Zone includes only about one-third (34.6 per cent) of the total number of employees of The Panama Canal and the Panama Railroad. It is evident, therefore, that the occupation statistics here presented do not convey a true impression of the magnitude of the industrial operations being carried on within the Canal Zone. This is due to the fact that many of the employees of The Panama Canal and the Panama Railroad reside outside the Canal Zone.

The occupation returns were classified, as nearly as possible, in accordance with the standardized census method; but as some of the enumerators returned the industry merely as "Panama Canal" or "Panama Railroad," it was not always possible to distinguish between persons engaged in the manufacturing and mechanical industries and those employed in the actual operation and maintenance of the canal.

The largest occupation group, including one-third of the gainfully employed population of the Canal Zone, is composed of those engaged in the various manufacturing and mechanical industries directly connected with the operation and maintenance of The Panama Canal and the Panama Railroad.

More than one-fourth (27.1 per cent) of the occupations reported were classified under transportation. As would naturally be expected, the proportion of the gainfully occupied population engaged in pursuits peculiar to transportation is much larger in the Canal Zone than it was in the United States in 1910 (6.9 per cent). The occupations of 591 persons were classified under railroad transportation, who represent only 8 per cent of the 7,358<sup>1</sup> employees of the Panama

Railroad reported at work on January 7, 1920. The explanation of the difference is found in the fact that the great majority of the Panama Railroad employees reside in the terminal cities of Colon and Panama, both of which are situated outside of the Canal Zone.

In Table 24 a comparison is made of the per cent distribution, by occupation groups, of the population of the United States and of the Canal Zone engaged in gainful pursuits.

A majority (56.5 per cent) of the 4,120 gainfully occupied Negroes residing within the Canal Zone were returned as laborers (1,969) or servants (360). On the other hand, only 87 white persons were so returned, and they constituted but 3.6 per cent of the total number of laborers and servants residing in the Canal Zone.

Table 25 shows, by race, the number of laborers and servants in each of the major occupation groups, and the percentage which each race contributes to the total number reported, in comparison with the total number of persons in all occupations.

## CENSUS OF GUAM

INTRODUCTION.<sup>1</sup>

This bulletin presents the results of the census of the island of Guam, which was taken by the Governor of Guam in accordance with plans prescribed by the Director of the Census, as required by the act of Congress approved March 3, 1919, providing for the Fourteenth and subsequent decennial censuses of the United States.

**Geography.**—Guam, the largest and southernmost island of the North Pacific group known as the Marianne or Marianas Islands, lies in latitude 13° 13' to 13° 40' north and in longitude 144° 37' to 144° 58' east of Greenwich. The island is located 5,053 nautical miles southwest of San Francisco, 3,337 nautical miles west by south of Honolulu, and 1,506 nautical miles east of Manila. It is about 30 miles in extreme length and from 4 to 8½ miles in width, its estimated area being 225 square miles. It extends almost north and south, the southern half lying slightly to the westward of the northern half.

The northern half of the island is a high, densely forested plateau ranging in elevation from 200 to 500 feet and is but sparsely settled. The southern part of Guam is mountainous. A chain of hills ranging in altitude from 700 to 1,300 feet begins near Pago Bay on the east coast, crosses the island to the west coast near the city of Agana, and follows that coast to the extreme southern end of the island. East of this coastal range is a high plateau, which terminates in abrupt cliffs at or near the eastern seacoast and is intersected by the valleys of five rivers, that have their sources near the top of the coastal range and, crossing nearly the whole width of the island, empty into the sea on the east coast. On the west coast the mountains merge into low foothills at some distance from the sea, leaving narrow strips of rolling land along the seashore suitable for agriculture. The east coast of the southern half of the island is indented by numerous bays bordered by narrow strips of fertile beach land. Coconut groves are planted near the sea, together with patches of corn, taro, and camotes.

The mountains of Guam are clearly of volcanic origin. Most of them are bare of forests, but are covered with shrubs and grasses. The mountains extending from the town of Agat on the west coast southward to Facpi Point are, however, heavily wooded.

There is no good harbor in Guam. The harbor of Apra is so shallow and so full of shoals that it is not navigable by large vessels, and the absence of breakwaters makes it unsafe during typhoons. At present vessels anchor in the deep water outside of the harbor, and passengers and freight are ferried through a shallow channel dredged across the reefs to the port of Piti, a distance of about 2 miles.

**Climate.**—The climate of Guam, although tropical, is, on the whole, healthful and pleasant. For six months of the year the northeast and east-northeast trade winds prevail, during which time there is relatively little rainfall; but from June to November the southwest monsoon blows at frequent intervals, bringing very abundant precipitation. During the rainy season the average monthly rainfall varies from 5 to 15 inches.

The mean annual temperature is 81°, and it is nearly constant throughout the year; the daily variation is small, the mean maximum temperature being 88° and the mean minimum 72°. There is always a constant breeze, even during the clearest and hottest months. Although typhoons are rather numerous during the rainy season, the island is seldom visited by destructive hurricanes. One of the most disastrous of these occurred on November 13, 1900, destroying all the crops and fruits and many houses.

Light earthquake shocks, scarcely noticeable during the day, are recorded about once a week. A very severe earthquake occurred on September 22, 1902, which ruined or damaged every masonry house on the island, scarred the mountain sides with great landslides, and caused some loss of life. The fiscal losses sustained by the insular government were so heavy that it became necessary to send the American school-teachers home, close all the native schools, and suspend all public works. In February, 1903, and again in December, 1909, less violent earthquakes were felt.

**Government.**—The island of Guam, which had been under the dominion of Spain for over 300 years preceding the outbreak of the Spanish-American War, was seized on June 21, 1898, by Capt. Henry Glass, of the United States Navy, who, having made prisoners of the Spanish governor and the military garrison, sailed the same day for Manila. The island was ceded by Spain to the United States on December 10, 1898, by the treaty of Paris, and on December 23, 1898, the

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President of the United States, by Executive order, placed the island under the control of the Navy Department. In compliance with that order, Commander Edward D. Taussig landed on the island February 1, 1899, took formal possession in the name of the United States, and raised the American flag over the governor's palace at Agana.

The present government of the island is known officially as the "Naval Government of Guam." The governor is appointed by the President of the United States, upon the recommendation of the Secretary of the Navy. All other officials, judicial as well as executive, are subordinate to him and are appointed and removed at his pleasure. The governor enacts all laws and is, in theory at least, responsible only to the President. The governor is also the commandant of the naval station.

For administrative purposes the island is divided into six districts, namely, Agana, Agat, Inarajan, Merizo, Sumay, and Yona. Each administrative district is in charge of a native commissioner, who is usually assisted by a deputy commissioner.

## POPULATION.

**Censuses.**—The annual reports of the Governor of Guam give the total number of native and foreign-born inhabitants separately, and the nationality of the foreign-born population. The local census of 1901 showed the total population by sex. The present census shows the population of each barrio, city, and town by sex and race or color (see Table 19, p. 8), and the total population of the island by age, sex, and marital condition, together with data in regard to school attendance, illiteracy, and occupations.

**Population growth.**—The census of 1920 is the first ever taken in Guam under the supervision of the United States Bureau of the Census. The first enumeration of the population of the island after its occupation by the United States Government was made in 1901, under the direction of the second naval governor. The following table shows the population of Guam at the census of 1920 and the population as reported by the governor in each specified year prior to 1920:

The increase in population since the American occupation of the island has been about 3,600, or 37.2 per cent, in 19 years. The increase in the 9

years between 1901 and 1910 was 2,130, or 22 per cent, and that in the 10 years between 1910 and 1920 was 1,469, or 12.4 per cent.

Although the population of Guam has been somewhat increased by immigration during this period, the substantial growth between 1901 and 1920 has been the result mainly of an excess of births over deaths. After the United States assumed control of Guam remarkable improvements in sanitary conditions were inaugurated throughout the island. As a result of these measures the death rate declined from 27.8 per 1,000 population in 1905 to 17.6 per 1,000 population in 1918. The decrease in population between 1918 and 1919 was due in some degree to the disastrous typhoon of July 6, 1918, but chiefly to the epidemic of influenza which swept over the island in October and November of 1918. From November 1 to December 31, 1918, there were 858 deaths, and the death rate for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1919, was 72.3 per 1,000 population.

The apparent decrease in population between 1919 and 1920 may possibly be explained by the fact that the population figures reported by the Governor of Guam for the years 1908 to 1919, inclusive, are careful estimates based on a local census taken in 1903, whereas the figure for 1920 represents the population as actually enumerated.

**Race.**—The native inhabitants of Guam, who constituted 92 per cent of the population of the island in 1920, are called Chamorros. The name Chamorro is derived from Chamorri or Chamoli, the ancient word for "noble." The Chamorros are a hybrid race, with the Malayan strain predominating. The ancient inhabitants were a warlike people, and most of the adult males were exterminated during the Spanish conquest. Subsequently many of the Spanish, Philippine, and Mexican soldiers who were brought to Guam to subdue the natives married or made concubines of the native women, and the present inhabitants are mainly the descendants of such unions. The various races have amalgamated so thoroughly that even the descendants of Englishmen and Scotchmen now call themselves Chamorros.

Table 2 shows the racial composition of the population of Guam in 1920.

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**Nativity.**—The population of Guam as enumerated at the census of 1920 included 164 persons who were born in foreign countries or possessions, 95 who were born in the Philippine Islands, and 33 who were born in the United States. The rest of the population, 97.8 per cent of the total, were natives of the island.

Table 3 shows the population of Guam by nativity and sex, while Table 4 gives the population by nativity and race. Most of the Filipinos and a majority of the whites are natives of Guam. Of the 210 Japanese, 77 were born in Japan; and of the 74 Chinese, 5 were born in China.

**Sex.**—In the population of Guam in 1920 there were 6,490 males and 6,785 females, a ratio of 95.7 males to 100 females. This sex ratio is very different from that of the United States, as shown by the census of 1910—106.2 males to 100 females—but it is similar to the sex ratios of most European countries, the excess of males in the United States being a result of the relatively large number of male immigrants in the total population.

It may be noted that the excess of females in Guam is confined to the native Chamorro population, for which the sex ratio in 1920 is 91.5 males to 100 females. Among the other races represented in the island there is an excess of males, as would be expected, since males usually predominate among immigrants.

In 1901, the only other year for which statistics relating to sex are available, there were 4,566 males and 5,110 females in Guam, a ratio of 89.4 males to 100 females.

As shown by Table 6, the excess of females in Guam is confined to the adult population, or the population 15 years of age and over, for which the ratio is 89.8 males to 100 females, while for the population under 15 it is 104 to 100. This excess of males in the population under 15 years of age is doubtless due partly if not wholly to an excess of male births over female births. The excess of females in the adult population indicates a higher death rate among males than among females, a condition which would not be peculiar to Guam, as in the United States the mortality rates are at all ages higher for males than for females.<sup>1</sup>

**Age.**—There was a much larger proportion of children in the population of Guam in 1920 than in the population of the United States in 1910. In 1920 about one-sixth (16.8 per cent) of the inhabitants of Guam were under 5 years of age, while only 11.6 per cent of the population of the United States in 1910 were under that age. More than one-half (54.1 per cent) of the inhabitants of Guam were under 20 years of age, as compared with 42 per cent in the United States. The percentages in each of the age periods over 19 years were somewhat higher in the United States than in Guam.

The relatively high proportion of children in the population of Guam as compared with that of the United States is probably explained, in part at least, by a high birth rate in that island.<sup>2</sup> A further explanation, however, is to be found in the fact that the age composition of the population of the United States is

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affected by the presence of a large immigrant population, consisting mainly of adults.

**Marital condition.**—Of the adult male population of the island, 41.7 per cent were single, 51.8 per cent married, and 6.4 per cent widowed or divorced. For the adult female population the corresponding percentages were 39.7, 46.9, and 13.4, respectively. That the percentage married should be higher for males than for females is easily explained by the fact that, while the number of married males is naturally nearly the same as the number of married females, the total number of males in Guam is considerably less than the total number of females.

The number (516) and percentage (13) of widows exceed the number (218) and percentage (6.1) of widowers, for the reason that in Guam, as elsewhere, women marry at a younger age than men, and therefore the marriage is more likely to be terminated by the death of the husband than by that of the wife.

Table 8 shows the adult population of Guam, by sex, age, and marital condition.

If the figures showing the marital condition of the population of Guam are compared with similar figures for the United States, the most striking difference, as shown by Table 9, is in the percentage single among the women—39.7 in Guam as compared with 29.7 in the United States. Such a difference is a natural or almost inevitable result of the fact that in the United States, as already pointed out, there is an excess of males in the total population and in Guam an excess of females. Since there are, in fact, 3,978 adult females as against 3,572 adult males in Guam, it may be said that 406 adult females in the island are necessarily single, which number is just about 10 per cent of the total adult female population of the island, and would therefore fully account for the difference between that island and the United States as regards the percentage single among females. The percentage of single males

in the adult male population is likewise higher for Guam than it is for the United States, but the difference is not very marked.

The relatively high proportions of widowed of each sex in Guam are probably explained by the fact that the influenza epidemic which raged throughout the world in the autumn and winter of 1918 was exceedingly fatal in Guam, the death rate having risen from 17.6 per 1,000 population for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1918, to 72.3 per 1,000 population for the following fiscal year.

School attendance.—The laws of Guam require all children from 7 to 12 years of age, inclusive, to attend the public schools, and children beyond the compulsory attendance age may continue in the schools on application. As a rule, only half-day sessions for each sex are possible, both on account of the prejudices of the natives and on account of lack of school room. A naval officer is the head of the department of education, with a civilian superintendent of public instruction as administrative officer. In 1919 there were 13 schools in Guam with a corps of 50 teachers and substitute teachers. Most of the American teachers are Federal employees detailed from the Navy Department. They are assigned to the more important schools and classes, the remainder of the teachers being natives educated in the public schools.

Table 10 shows the number and per cent of children attending school in Guam, by sex and age periods.

At the census of 1920 only 42.9 per cent of the population 5 to 19 years of age, inclusive, reported that they had attended school at some time since September 1, 1919. This percentage is very much lower than the corresponding percentage of school attendance in the United States (62.6) shown by the census of 1910. The relatively poor school attendance in Guam is due almost entirely to inadequate public revenues for educational purposes. Although the total figures indicate poor school attendance, it should be noted that over three-fourths (77 per cent) of the boys and 62.8 per cent of the girls 10 to 14 years of age were reported as attending school. In the United States in 1909-10, 87.7 per cent of the boys and 88.6 per cent of the girls 10 to 14 years of age attended school. The higher proportion of males (46.4 per cent) than of females (39.3 per cent) attending school in Guam is explained in part by the indifference of the natives to the education of girls.

Comparative statistics of school attendance in Guam derived from the annual reports of the governor for the fiscal years 1906 to 1919 (except 1914 and 1915, for which years no figures are available), together with comparable figures derived from the census of 1920, are shown in the following table:

The total number of children attending school in Guam increased from 1,620 in 1906 to 2,117 in 1920, an increase of 30.7 per cent in 14 years. The marked decrease in attendance between June, 1918, and June, 1919, was due mainly to the high mortality resulting from the influenza epidemic of 1918, but also to the typhoon of July 6, 1918, which seriously damaged many schoolhouses.

An interesting and significant development in the educational policy of Guam was the introduction in February, 1917, of compulsory physical and military training for all schoolboys 7 to 16 years of age. In 1919 there were 946 boys enrolled for this training. At the age of 16 the boys pass automatically into the Guam militia. They remain in the militia until they reach the age of 23, when they may, upon request, retire from active duty.

Illiteracy.—In 1920, 2,011 persons, or 21.8 per cent of the population of Guam 10 years of age and over, were reported as unable to write, and of this number, 1,526, or one-sixth of the population, could neither read nor write. The percentage of illiterate females (29.6) is more than double that of males (13.3), the relatively high illiteracy rate for females being due mainly to the indifference of the natives to the education of girls.

The table at the top of the following page shows the number and per cent distribution of literate and illiterate in the population of Guam 10 years of age and over, by sex.

The percentages of illiteracy are very much higher for the age groups over 24 years than they are for persons under that age, owing to the fact that the older people of Guam have never received the benefits of the American system of public schools. Under the earlier Spanish governors public education in Guam was discouraged, because the rulers believed that the natives would be more tractable if they remained

illiterate. In later years, however, free schools were established, and by the time the United States assumed control of the island a majority of the natives could read and write in Spanish. The efforts of the Americans to teach the Chamorro children to use the English language have not been very successful up to the present time.

Table 13 shows the number and per cent illiterate in the population of Guam 10 years of age and over, by sex and by age periods.

A comparison of the percentage of illiteracy in Guam (21.8) in 1920 with that of the United States (7.7), as shown by the report of the census of 1910, demonstrates the effectiveness of the public-school system in reducing the illiteracy rate of the United States as a whole. It is noteworthy, however, that the percentage of illiterates among Negroes in the United States in 1910 (30.4) was very much higher than the illiteracy rate of Guam. For the age periods under 25 years the percentages of illiteracy in Guam in 1920 are not much higher than those for the total population of the United States in 1910, the rates for the age period 15 to 19 years being practically the same.

**Ability to speak English.**—The total number of persons in Guam who reported that they were able to speak English was 4,384—2,542 males and 1,842 females. They constituted almost one-half (47.6 per cent) of the population of Guam 10 years of age and over. A much larger proportion of the males (57.7 per cent) than of the females (38.3 per cent) 10 years of age and over reported ability to speak English.

**Occupations.**—The occupation returns of the census of 1920 show clearly that agriculture is the chief industry of Guam. More than one-half (52.2 per cent) of the population for whom occupations were returned were engaged in agriculture and animal husbandry. Nearly all of these (97.9 per cent) were males, and they constituted 60.9 per cent of all males engaged in gainful pursuits.

Domestic and personal service employed one-sixth of the occupied population, nearly three-fourths (73.7 per cent) of those so employed being females.

All persons returned as engaged in public service in Guam were males. They numbered 187 and constituted 5.5 per cent of the total number of occupied males.

Table 15 shows the number and per cent of persons in Guam engaged in each specified occupation and in each occupation group, by sex.

Table 16 shows the occupations of the population of Guam by color or race. Over one-half (54.2 per cent) of the Chamorros for whom occupations were reported were employed in agriculture and animal husbandry. There are no factories in Guam, but 695, or 18.9 per cent, of the Chamorros reported that they were employed in various building and hand trades and as laborers in nonspecified industries. Over one-sixth (17.2 per cent) of the Chamorros were engaged in domestic and personal service.

**Working children.**—In 1920 one person in each ten of the population of Guam for whom specific occupa-tions were reported in the census was a child under 17 years of age. Most of these working children (89.1 per cent) were over 12 years of age, the maximum age for compulsory school attendance. Nearly 80 per cent (79.1) were boys, and almost all of them (94.2 per cent) were native Chamorro children.

Table 17 shows the number of working children in Guam, by age and sex; and Table 18 shows the princi-pal occupations of these children and the percentage which they formed of the total number of persons engaged in each specified occupation, by sex.

Nearly one-half (49.5 per cent) of the working children of Guam were returned as farm laborers, constituting 32.2 per cent of all persons so returned in the census. All but 1 of them were boys, and all but 18 were employed on home farms. More than one-half (51.9 per cent) of the males and 40.9 per cent of the females returned as servants were children under 17 years of age. It is noteworthy that 5 children—2 boys and 3 girls—were returned as school-teachers.

## AGRICULTURE.

Field crops.—A census of agriculture was taken in Guam in connection with the census of population. The statistics of production relate to the calendar year 1919.

As measured by the number of acres reported under cultivation in 1919, corn is by far the most important field crop of Guam, representing 60.3 per cent of the total. During that year, 28,947 bushels of corn

were harvested, averaging 13.3 bushels to the acre. Two other crops of importance are sweet potatoes and taro. The sweet potato crop in 1919 totaled 13,671 bushels, an average yield of 25½ bushels per acre. The average yield of taro was 2,710 per acre.

Table 20 shows the acreage, quantity produced, and average yield per acre of nine different field crops of Guam in 1919.

The island of Guam is not at present self-supporting, but it is believed that it could be made so by the proper development of its agriculture. There is more arable land in Guam than the present population can cultivate with the means at hand. Most of the farmers live in the towns and go to and from their farms on foot or in bull carts, thus wasting much time. The greater part of the farming is done with crude hand tools, but modern plows and other agricultural implements are being gradually introduced. On account of the very shallow layer of soil over the "cascajo" (coral limestone), only a comparatively small amount of land can be cultivated with animal-drawn implements. About one-half of the total area of the island is suitable for agriculture and pasturage.

Owing to the fact that there are at present no facilities for storing food crops and also because of the lack of good roads, there is little incentive for the native farmers of Guam to produce more food than is required for their own immediate consumption.

In 1919 the island government opened a public market at Agana, to which the native farmers may bring their produce for sale. The United States Department of Agriculture maintains two experiment farms in Guam primarily to teach the natives modern methods of farming and to stimulate interest in the breeding of live stock.

**Tree products.**—Coconuts are the most important of the tree products of Guam. In 1919, 61.2 per cent of all the fruit and seed bearing trees reported in the census were coconut trees, and they yielded approximately 7,650,000 coconuts, or an average of 19 per tree. Not only are coconuts used extensively as food by all of the natives, but copra, or dried coconut meat, from which the oil is later expressed, is the chief product for export from Guam. The following table shows the amount of copra exported from Guam to the United States and to Japan from 1915 to 1919, inclusive:

Banana trees constituted nearly one-fourth (23.9 per cent) of the fruit and seed bearing trees of Guam, yielding 117,298 bunches in 1919. Tropical fruits are not produced for export from Guam at present, but coffee and cacao of excellent quality are now grown and could be profitably cultivated for export.

Table 22 shows the number of the principal fruit and seed bearing trees of Guam, the amount of their products, and the average yield per tree in 1919.

**Live stock.**—The number and varieties of live stock not on farms enumerated in Guam included 6,149 carabao, 4,367 horses, 1,160 goats, 543 hogs, and 73 cattle.

It will be noted that there are much larger numbers of carabao than of horses on the island. The carabao, or water buffalo, is the chief burden-bearing animal of Guam, being used both for drawing carts and for plowing. The natives seldom eat the meat of the carabao; and although its milk is of excellent quality, it is rarely used for food.

Neither horses nor cattle have multiplied rapidly since their introduction into Guam. The island government, however, has acquired a small herd of fine cattle and is endeavoring to interest the native farmers in scientific methods of stock breeding and raising.

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#### TOTAL POPULATION, INCREASE, AND DISTRIBUTION.

**Population of the territory.**—Hawaii came into the possession of the United States in 1898 and was organized as a territory in June, 1900. According to the Fourteenth Census, taken as of January 1, 1920, its population is 255,912, which represents an increase of 64,003, or 33.4 per cent, over the population in 1910. During the same period the population of the United States increased by 14.9 per cent. The following summary shows the population of Hawaii as returned

at the last three Federal censuses and at earlier censuses taken by the Hawaiian Government, these earlier enumerations having been made at irregular intervals from 1832 to 1853 and at six-year intervals from 1860 to 1896. The census of 1896 was taken in September, and each of the censuses from 1866 to 1890 was taken in December. No information is available concerning the months in which the enumerations prior to 1866 were made.

**Counties.**—Hawaii is divided into five counties, of which four showed increases and one a decrease as compared with 1910: One of these counties, Hawaii, is coextensive with the island of the same name, and Honolulu, the largest, comprises the two islands of Oahu and Midway. (See Table 1.)

**Density of population.**—The total land area of Hawaii is 6,449 square miles, and the average number of persons to the square mile in 1920 is 39.7 (see table 1), as against 29.8 in 1910 and 23.9 in 1900.

**Islands.**—The territory of Hawaii is an archipelago of nine inhabited islands—Hawaii, Maui, Oahu, Kauai, Molokai, Lanai, Niihau, Kahoolawe, and Midway—and a number of small uninhabited islands. The island from which the archipelago is named, Hawaii,

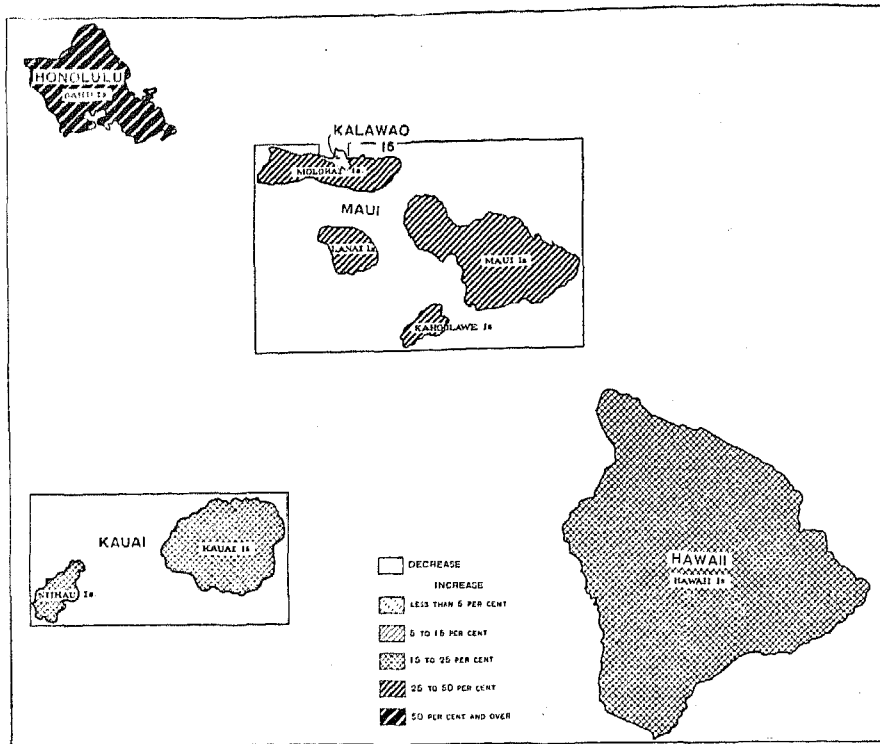
is the largest and was formerly the most important. (See Table 2.)

**Minor civil divisions.**—The political units into which the counties are divided are collectively termed "minor civil divisions." The counties of Hawaii are made up of 28 primary divisions, comprising 27 election districts and the island of Midway. One secondary division, Hilo city, forms a part of one of the primary divisions. (See Table 3.)

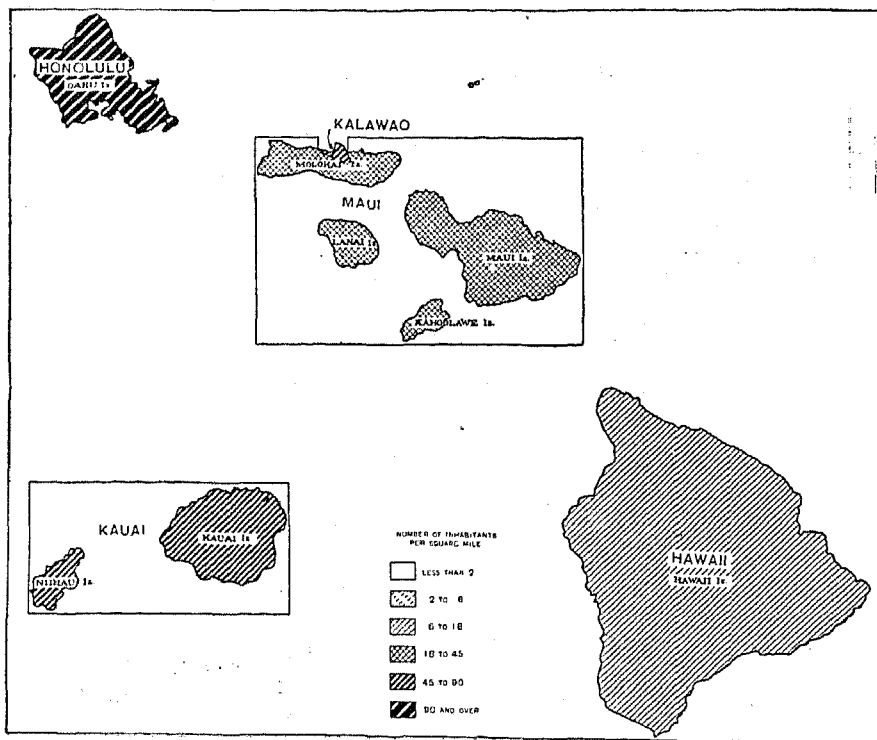
**Cities.**—The only incorporated city in Hawaii is Hilo, in South Hilo district, Hawaii County; but Honolulu district (on the island of Oahu, Honolulu County), the seat of the Hawaiian Government, is generally considered as Honolulu city. (See Table 4.)

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#### TOTAL POPULATION, INCREASE, AND DISTRIBUTION.

**Total population.**—The island of Porto Rico was formally surrendered by Spain to the United States in October, 1898, and by the treaty of Paris, signed December 10 of the same year, at the close of the Spanish-American War, was ceded to the United States, together with Vieques, Culebra, and other small adjacent islands.

According to the Fourteenth Census, taken as of January 1, 1920, the population of Porto Rico is 1,299,809, which represents an increase of 181,797, or 16.3 per cent, since 1910. During the same period the population of the United States, exclusive of outlying possessions, increased by 14.9 per cent. The following summary shows the population of Porto Rico as enumerated at the Federal decennial censuses of 1920 and 1910, at the special census taken under the direction of the War Department in 1899, and at nine earlier censuses taken at irregular intervals between 1765 and 1887:

**Municipalities.**—Porto Rico is divided, for the purpose of local government, into 76 districts, called municipalities. Each of the islands of Culebra and Vieques constitutes an entire municipality, and the

remaining small adjacent islands form parts of municipalities. (See Table 1.)

Of these 76 municipalities, 8 have been organized from parts of 9 others since 1910. It has been necessary, therefore, in preparing the map on page 3, showing rates of increase and decrease in total and rural population since 1910, to make the following combinations: Bayamon, Guaynabo, and Rio Piedras; Ceiba, Fajardo, Luquillo, and Rio Grande; Guanica and Yauco; Hormigueros and Mayaguez; Humacao and Las Piedras; Jayuya and Utuado; Juana Diaz and Villalba.

Except in the case of San Juan, which is wholly urban, each of these municipalities consists of a central settlement with outlying rural districts. The division between the towns or villages and the remainder of the municipalities is merely physical, there being no political boundaries between the urban and rural portions.

**Density of population.**—The gross area of Porto Rico, land and water, including the adjacent and dependent islands, is 3,435 square miles. The average number of inhabitants to the square mile in 1920 was 378.4, as against 325.5 in 1910 and 277.5 in 1899. The population per square mile in 1920 was more than ten times as great as the average for the United States, exclusive of outlying possessions.

**Minor civil divisions.**—The political units into which Porto Rico's municipalities are divided are the barrios, which may in general be distinguished as urban and rural. The urban barrio or barrios constitute, as a rule, the city or town from which the

municipality takes its name. Such cities and towns, which occupy the closely settled area, have no form of government distinct from that of the municipality to which they belong. In the municipality of San Juan all the barrios are urban in character, the city being coextensive with the municipality. In most of the smaller municipalities a single barrio, usually designated as "pueblo," constitutes the town settlement. In other municipalities the town is composed of two or more barrios. In a few cases there are located in a municipality, in addition to the principal settlement, from which it takes its name, one or more detached settlements, which in this report are termed villages in order to distinguish them from the towns. Although as a rule the urban area constitutes the entire area of the barrio or barrios in which a town is located, there are a number of instances in which a barrio contains both urban and rural territory.

In addition to the above-mentioned minor civil divisions, there are in the municipality of San Juan one military reserve and one naval reserve (radio station), and a naval radio station is located in the municipality of Cayey.

Table 2 shows the population of Porto Rico by municipalities and barrios. Under the name of each municipality that of the town from which the municipality is named is first given, together with the names of the barrios, if more than one, which it comprises. The names of the remaining barrios follow in alphabetical order, except in cases where at the census of 1899 two or more barrios were combined in making the population returns. In such cases the barrios are listed together for the purpose of comparison.

**Principal places.**—Porto Rico has two cities, of which San Juan, with a population of 71,443, ranks first, and Ponce, with 41,912 inhabitants, is second in size. In addition, there are 74 towns and 3 villages. (See Table 3.)

The summary in the next column shows, for each city or town having 5,000 or more inhabitants in 1920, the population at each of the last three censuses and the percentage of increase.

**Urban and rural population.**—For purposes of comparison it is of interest to classify the population of Porto Rico as urban or rural in accordance with the method adopted by the Bureau of the Census in classifying the population of continental United States. Urban population is defined as that residing in cities, towns, or villages having 2,500 inhabitants or more, and rural population as that residing outside such cities, towns, or villages.

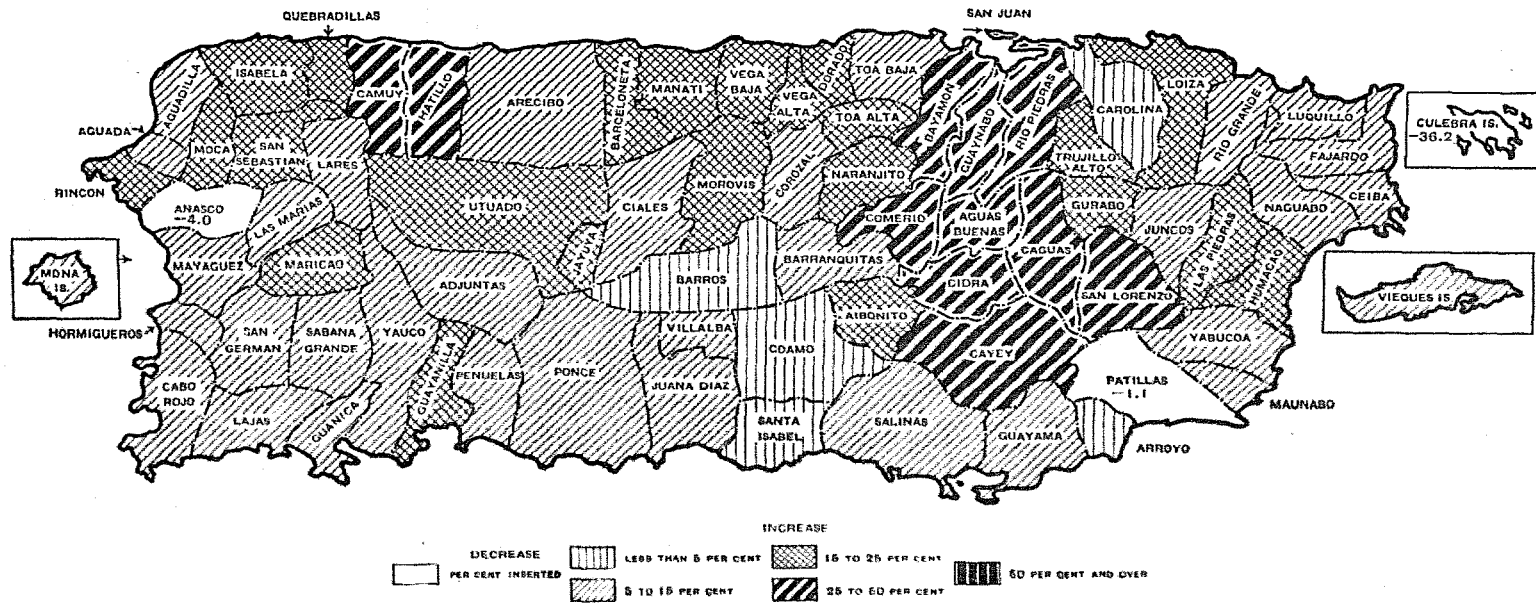
The following summary presents, for the last three censuses, figures showing the urban and rural population of Porto Rico distributed among places grouped according to specified limits of population. The classification for each census is based upon the population of the various places as shown by the returns of that census. Consequently the territory designated as urban or rural or that comprised within any one class of urban or rural places does not remain fixed, because any given place may, through the growth or the decline of its population, pass from one class to another at successive censuses. The proportion of the population of Porto Rico living in places of 2,500 or more increased from 14.6 per cent in 1899 to 20.1 per cent in 1910 and to 21.8 per cent in 1920.

INTRODUCCIÓN.

Este boletín preliminar presenta la población de Puerto Rico, incluyendo las islas adyacentes, por municipalidades y barrios, según enumerada en el Censo Décimocuarto de los Estados Unidos, tomado en enero 1, 1920, con tablas comparativas de población, cuando es posible, y una tabla concerniente a la población de municipalidades que vive en territorio urbano y rural respectivamente. Las estadísticas se presentan detalladamente en cuatro tablas generales.

La tabla No. 1 muestra la población de Puerto Rico por municipalidades, en los censos Federales de 1920 y 1910 y el censo especial de 1899 tomado bajo la dirección del Departamento de la Guerra, con el aumento durante los períodos intermediarios.

La tabla No. 2 muestra la población de Puerto Rico distribuída con relación a las municipalidades y barrios

en los censos de 1920, 1910, y 1899. Bajo cada municipalidad el pueblo por el cual la municipalidad es llamada es dado primeramente; entonces siguen el barrio o barrios que constituyen el pueblo. El resto de los barrios de la municipalidad están clasificados por orden alfabético, excepto en los casos donde dos ó más barrios fueron combinados en los censos de 1910 y 1899. En tales casos las subdivisiones están dadas juntas con el propósito de poder hacer comparaciones.

La tabla No. 3 muestra para 1920, 1910, y 1899 la población de las ciudades de San Juan y Ponce y de los pueblos y aldeas por orden alfabético.

La tabla No. 4 muestra el número y por ciento de la población que vive en ciudades, pueblos, o aldeas de 2,500 habitantes o más para esas municipalidades que incluyen uno, o más de tales lugares y cuya población es designada como urbana.

POBLACIÓN TOTAL, AUMENTO, Y DISTRIBUCIÓN.

**Población total.**—La población de Puerto Rico en 1920 era 1,297,772. Comparada con la población de 1,118,012 en 1910, esto representa un aumento durante los 10 años de 179,760, o 16.1 por ciento.

Hubo un aumento durante los 11 años desde 1899 a 1910 de 17.3 por ciento. El promedio de aumento anual desde noviembre 10, 1899, hasta abril 15, 1910, fué 15,796.8, y desde abril 15, 1920, hasta enero 1, 1920, fué 18,516.

**Localidades principales.**—Puerto Rico tiene 2 ciudades, 74 pueblos, y 4 aldeas. La ciudad de San Juan, la localidad más populosa, tenía una población en 1920 de 70,707, y Ponce que le sigue tenía una población de 41,561. Mayagüez, con 19,069 habitantes; Caguas, con 12,154; Bayamón, con 10,411; y

Arecibo, con 10,039, fueron las otras localidades en la isla que tenían más de 10,000 habitantes. También había 10 localidades que tenían de 5,000 a 10,000, 16 localidades que tenían de 2,500 a 5,000, y 48 localidades que tenían menos de 2,500 habitantes.

**Densidad de la población.**—El área total de Puerto Rico, agua y tierra, incluyendo las islas adyacentes bajo su jurisdicción, es 3,435 millas cuadradas. El promedio de personas por milla cuadrada en 1920 era 377.8, y en 1910, 325.5, siendo un aumento de 52.3 habitantes por milla cuadrada.

**Distritos municipales y divisiones civiles menores.**—Puerto Rico está dividido para los propósitos de gobierno local, en 76 distritos, llamados municipalidades. Estas municipalidades consisten generalmente de un lugar urbanizado (pueblo) y los distritos rurales que le rodean. San Juan es la única excepción donde no se encuentran distritos rurales. Cada municipalidad tiene un gobierno que incluye el pueblo y los distritos rurales y por esta razón la división entre el pueblo principal ó aldea y el resto de la municipalidad es solamente geográfica y no política.

Las municipalidades están divididas en barrios, que pueden ser clasificados como barrios urbanos o rurales según sea el caso. El barrio o barrios urbanos constituyen por lo general la ciudad o pueblo del cual la municipalidad toma el nombre. Tales ciudades y pueblos, los cuales constituyen esa parte de la población que vive en las localidades densamente pobladas, no tienen una forma de gobierno distinto de ese de la entera municipalidad del cual ellos son los centros. En una municipalidad—San Juan— todos los barrios son urbanos, la ciudad abrazando todos los barrios de la municipalidad. En la mayoría de las municipalidades más pequeñas el pueblo está constituido por un solo barrio que constituye el lugar urbanizado. En otras municipalidades el pueblo está compuesto de dos o más barrios de carácter urbano. En varios casos las localidades

densamente pobladas no abarcan toda el área del barrio o barrios donde se encuentra el pueblo. En estos casos los enumeradores fueron instruidos cuidadosamente para que separaran los distritos rurales del pueblo propiamente. En algunas municipalidades hay además del poblado principal que le da el nombre a la municipalidad otro poblado por separado, que en este caso se le llama aldea para distinguirlo del pueblo.

Además de las divisiones mencionadas arriba hay una reserva militar y una reserva naval que están incluidas en la municipalidad de San Juan, y la estación de telégrafo sin hilos en la municipalidad de Cayey; y además de las islas de Culebra y Vieques, que son dadas como municipalidades, hay otras islas pequeñas incluidas en las municipalidades adyacentes.

El mapa muestra el aumento o decremento en la población total de cada municipalidad de Puerto Rico desde 1910. El área de la municipalidad según era en 1920 es usada para calcular el aumento ó decremento en población desde 1910 (véase tabla No. 1). En las municipalidades mostradas en blanco la población disminuyó; para las otras municipalidades los diferentes promedios de aumento están indicados por la diferencia en sombraje.

**Comparación de la población rural y urbana.**—Para el propósito de comparación es de interés clasificar la población de Puerto Rico en urbana o rural de acuerdo con la distinción adoptada por la Oficina del Censo para clasificar la población de los Estados Unidos. La población que reside en ciudades, pueblos, o aldeas de 2,500 habitantes o más es clasificada como urbana; la población de pueblos más pequeños y aldeas y de distritos rurales es clasificada como rural.

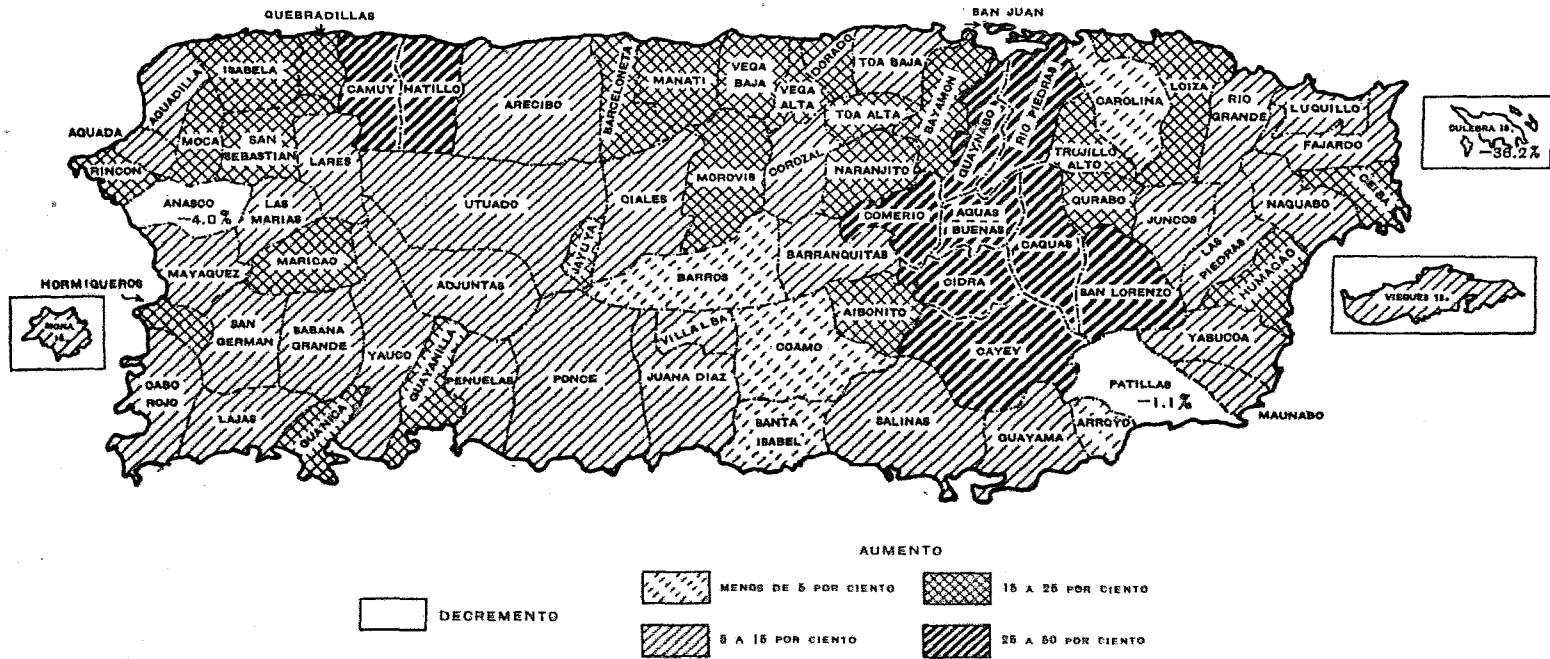

## CENSUS OF AMERICAN SAMOA

## INTRODUCTION.

This bulletin gives the results of the census of American Samoa, which, as required by the act of March 3, 1919, providing for the Fourteenth and subsequent decennial censuses of the United States, was taken by the governor of American Samoa in accordance with plans prescribed by the Director of the Census.

**Geography.**—The group of South Pacific islands known as American Samoa lie in latitude  $14^{\circ} 11'$  to  $14^{\circ} 23'$  south and in longitude  $169^{\circ} 29'$  to  $170^{\circ} 52'$  west of Greenwich. A clearer idea of their location may be gained from the statement that the distance from Tutuila, the largest island of the American Samoas, to San Francisco is 4,160 nautical miles; to Honolulu, 2,263 nautical miles; and to Sidney, Australia, 2,354 nautical miles.

American Samoa includes six islands, namely, Rose, Manua, Olosega, Ofu, Tutuila, and Aunuu. Rose Island is an uninhabited coral atoll. The islands of Manua, Olosega, and Ofu are generally known as the Manua Islands, and the term "Tutuila," as commonly used, includes, in addition to the island of that name, the small island of Aunuu.

Tutuila, a densely wooded and fertile island, is the largest and most important of the American Samoas. It is 18 miles long, and its greatest width is about 6 miles. Its exact area is unknown, the estimates varying from 40.2 square miles to 77 square miles. A mountain ridge extends nearly the entire length of the island. In the southwestern part there is a broad plain on which several villages are located.

Pago Pago Bay, regarded by mariners as one of the finest harbors in the South Seas, enters the south central part of the island of Tutuila. Encircling the bay are high mountains which protect vessels anchored in the harbor from the severest storms. The United States naval station and the governor's residence, as well as the villages of Pago Pago, Fagatogo, Utulei, Fagaalu, Lepua, and Aua, are situated on this bay. The harbor may be safely navigated by vessels of the largest type.

Manua. Tau Island, is located 60 miles east of Tutuila, and has an estimated area of 14 square miles. It is very mountainous, the center having an elevation of about 2,500 feet. Tau, the largest village on Manua Island, is located on the west coast but has no harbor. Faleasao Bay, on the extreme north-

west coast, affords an excellent anchorage for vessels during the southeast trade winds.

The island of Olosega lies  $3\frac{1}{2}$  miles northwest of Manua. It is separated from the island of Ofu by a narrow and shallow passage. Both of these islands are mountainous, and their combined area is about 2 square miles.

**Climate.**—As the Samoas lie wholly within the South Torrid Zone, the climate is tropical. During the summer months, December to February, the temperature is highest, and during the winter months, June to August, it is coolest. The highest temperature is about  $88^{\circ}$  and the lowest about  $70^{\circ}$ . Hurricanes occasionally visit these islands. The rainy season extends from December to March, the greatest average rainfall occurring in February and the least in July.

**Government.**—The United States Government took formal possession of American Samoa February 19, 1900. On that date the President signed an Executive order placing these islands under the control of the Navy Department. The Secretary of the Navy appoints the commandant of the naval station at Pago Pago, and the commandant also serves as governor of American Samoa. Beginning with 1905, the commandant has held a commission as governor conferred upon him by the President, following his nomination by the Secretary of the Navy, and his civil powers are derived therefrom. A secretary of native affairs, acting under the direction of the governor, has jurisdiction over native affairs. The chief customs officer and other important civil officials are appointed by the governor from the naval station personnel.

For administrative purposes American Samoa is divided into three districts: Eastern District of Tutuila, Western District of Tutuila, and Manua District. Each administrative district is ruled by a native governor appointed by the American governor. The administrative districts are divided into counties, each of which is governed by a native chief appointed by the American governor. District governors are chosen from the rank of county chief. All laws are enacted by the American governor and enforced by the native governors and chiefs. Health regulations, when approved by the governor, have the force of laws. The family is the unit of native Samoan society, and the right of suffrage is restricted to the heads of families, the "matais."

## POPULATION.

**Censuses of population.**—The census of 1920 is the first ever taken in American Samoa under the supervision of the United States Bureau of the Census. Previous enumerations of the inhabitants of these islands have been made under the direction of the governor. With the exception of the censuses of 1912 and 1916, the published results of these enumerations show only the total population by administrative districts. The census of 1916 showed the total population of Tutuila and the Manua Islands, separately, by sex. At the census of 1912 the population, by sex, was reported for each administrative district and village. The present census gives the population of each district, county, and village, classified according to race and sex (see Table 11), and the total population classified by age and marital condition, besides data as to school attendance, illiteracy, and occupations.

**Population growth.**—The following table shows the population as enumerated by successive censuses which have been taken since the United States came into control of this territory:

When the United States assumed control of the islands in 1900, the total population, as enumerated by the local census, was 5,679. As the recent census shows a population of 8,056, the increase since the American occupation has been 2,377, or about 42 per cent, in 20 years. The increase in the 12 years between 1900 and 1912 was 1,572, or nearly 28 per cent, and that in the 8 years between 1912 and 1920 was 805, or about 11 per cent. Most of this population growth has taken place in Tutuila, the population of Manua having increased but little. The decrease in the population of Manua between 1912 and 1916, as shown by Table 1, is noteworthy as a reminder of the destructive hurricane which visited that island in January, 1915, and which, although it did not cause any great loss of life, swept away or destroyed so much of the vegetation of the island that it was found expedient to transport about two-thirds of the inhabitants to the island of Tutuila that they

might be adequately fed and properly cared for. The people thus transported were distributed among the different families in Tutuila, where they remained for several months.

**Race.**—The total population of American Samoa enumerated in the census of 1920 included only 41 white persons. The native Polynesians constituted over 96 per cent of the total and those of "mixed" race about 3 per cent, the latter being for the most part the children of white fathers and Polynesian mothers.

**Sex.**—In the population of American Samoa in 1920 there were 4,139 males and 3,917 females, a ratio of 105.7 males to 100 females, which is about the same as the sex ratio shown for the total population of the United States in 1910, 106 to 100, but is larger than the corresponding ratio for the native white population of the United States, 102.7 to 100.

**Age.**—Registration of births was not compulsory in American Samoa prior to the establishment of the American government 20 years ago; and as comparatively few of the older natives know how old they are, the census enumerators were obliged to estimate the ages of most Samoans over 20 years of age. The reported ages of the population under 20 years are believed to be fairly accurate and the ages of the older people are probably sufficiently accurate for a classification by broad age groups.

There was a much higher proportion of children in the population of American Samoa in 1920 than in the population of continental United States in 1910. Thus, in 1920, nearly 16 per cent (15.8) of the inhabitants of American Samoa were children under 5 years of age, while only 11.6 per cent of the population of continental United States were under 5 years of age in 1910; the proportion under 15 years was 39.1 per cent in Samoa, as compared with 32.1 per cent in continental United States. The age composition of the population of the United States is, of course, affected by the presence of a large immigrant population, consisting mainly of adults. This element is not present in the population of Samoa. But the main explanation of the relatively large proportion of children in Samoa is probably to be found in a high birth rate accompanied by a comparatively high death rate, a condition which is characteristic of most primitive races and naturally results in a large number of children and a comparatively small number of old people.

Nearly 48 per cent of the inhabitants of American Samoa were 15 to 44 years of age, which was about the same proportion as that for continental United States in 1910—48.8 per cent. The percentage of inhabitants 45 years of age and over was considerably lower in Samoa in 1920 (13.2) than it was in continental United States in 1910 (18.9).

**Marital condition.**—Nearly 40 per cent (39.9) of the male inhabitants of American Samoa 15 years of age and over were returned as single in 1920, as contrasted with 27.2 per cent of the female population of those ages. This difference is indicative of the fact that women in Samoa, as elsewhere, marry much earlier in life than men. Thus the figures show that 48 per cent of the females 20 to 24 years of age were married, as compared with 20.5 per cent of the males at the same age period. It is not until the age groups over 44 years are reached that the percentage married among males exceeds that among females, this difference being due to the high percentage of widowed among females in these age groups.

In Samoa there were 113 widowers and 287 widows reported in the census. An excess of widows is not

peculiar to Samoa, being a natural consequence of the fact already referred to that women marry at an earlier age than men. The wife being, therefore, as a rule younger than the husband, the marriage is more likely to be terminated by his death than by hers.

The total figures indicate nothing abnormal or peculiar in the marital relationship in Samoa, the percentage in each marital class being about the same as that for the population of continental United States in 1910, as given in Table 6 on the next page.

A comparison by age periods, however, brings out the fact that in the population above 35 years of age there is a considerably smaller percentage of single persons of each sex in Samoa than in the United States; also a considerably larger percentage of widowed. The comparison may be affected by the large element of error in the reported ages of the Samoan population, but doubtless among a primitive people, such as the Samoans, marriages take place at an earlier age than among a more highly civilized people, and relatively fewer people remain permanently single.

It may be noted that the percentages representing persons reported as divorced for both males and females were somewhat higher than the corresponding percentages in the census of the United States for 1910. But there is reason to believe that the number of divorced persons reported in the census

of the United States is considerably below the actual number<sup>1</sup>; and for that matter, the census enumerators in Samoa found that there was likewise some reluctance on the part of divorced Samoans to report their true marital status.

School attendance.—In 1920, as shown in Table 7, nearly 70 per cent (69.9) of the population 5 to 20 years of age, inclusive, reported that they had attended school at some time since September 1, 1919. This percentage is considerably higher than the corresponding percentage of school attendance in continental United States (59.2) shown by the census of 1910. School attendance in the Samoan Islands, however, does not signify all that it does in most American communities,

as is evident from the following description of the Samoan schools taken from a report of the governor of Samoa published in 1916:

The foundation of the school system of American Samoa is the parish school, conducted by the native pastors of the various denominations. These schools are of varying efficiency, but none of them could be classed as good. The children go to these schools four days of the week, for about one to three hours a day, depending upon the energy of the pastor. There is no governmental supervision, except that by a law all children between the ages of 6 and 13 years are required to attend school regularly. The subjects taught are reading, writing, spelling, arithmetic, grammar, and geography, with a large proportion of time given to religious instruction. The textbooks are printed in the Samoan language. It is said that all Samoans are able to read and to write, but their education is extremely limited, except as to the Bible, with which they are more familiar than is the average American.

Only two-thirds (66.4 per cent) of the female children 5 to 20 years of age attended school, as compared with nearly three-fourths (73.1 per cent) of the male population of those ages. The difference in the proportions of the sexes who attended school was even more striking in the age group 15 to 20 years—63.4 per cent for males and 51.7 for females; and somewhat higher proportions of males than females were found in the younger age groups also. As there was no governmental provision in American Samoa for enforcing school attendance, it is probable that many of the girls of school age were kept at home to assist their mothers in the care of younger children.

Statistics of school attendance in American Samoa in 1912 and in 1920 are presented in Table 8. The figures for 1912 probably represent actual school enrollment on a given date. School attendance of female children increased 11.1 per cent during this period, while that of males increased less than 1 per cent (0.5).

Illiteracy.—In 1920, 96 persons in every 100 of the population 10 years of age and over in American Samoa were reported as able to read and write. This condition is due largely to the educational zeal of the Christian missionaries who established religious schools in the Samoan villages as early as 1830.

Although only 239 Samoans—107 males and 132 females—were returned as illiterate, the education of the average native is extremely limited, and it should be noted that in most cases the ability to read and write is restricted to reading and writing the Samoan language.

Only 37 persons 10 to 19 years of age were returned as illiterate. The percentage of illiterates among females 10 years of age and over was slightly higher than that among males—4.8 per cent for the former, as compared with 3.6 per cent for the latter.

**Ability to speak English.**—As practically all instruction in the schools of American Samoa is given in the native Samoan language, it is not surprising that only 591 Polynesians reported that they were able to speak English. They constituted only 7.6 per cent of the total Polynesian population and 12.3 per cent of the Polynesian population 15 years of age and over.

**Occupations.**—No discussion of the occupations of the population of American Samoa would be intelligible unless preceded by a brief description of the Samoan family. At the head of each social group known as a family is a "matai." The word "matai" may be freely translated as "master." The matai is the ruler of his family (aiga) and directs its economic and political activities. The title of matai is not strictly hereditary. The son of a matai may succeed to the title, or it may be given to an uncle, a cousin, or some other relative. In exceptional cases it may be conferred, by common consent, upon some one outside of the family group.

A Samoan family may consist of the matai and his wife and children, his uncles, aunts, nephews, nieces, cousins, sons-in-law, daughters-in-law, adopted children, and servants. These families vary greatly in size. As many as 50 persons may be members of a Samoan family. In rare instances, a matai may be the only surviving member of his family.

Each normal Samoan family is a self-sustaining economic group, the members of which, including the matai, contribute the products of their labor to the family fund. There is no incentive for one member to work harder than another. If the matai is energetic and ambitious, the family is likely to prosper, as the members look to him for inspiration and leadership.

In 1920, 787 Polynesians and 9 persons of mixed blood were returned as matais. They constituted 56.1 per cent of the 1,420 persons whose occupations were reported, there being approximately 1 matai to every 10 Polynesians. These figures, however, do not represent the total number of persons holding this title in American Samoa, since many matais have specialized vocations, such as those of village or county chief, clergyman, teacher, clerk, or even tradesman or skilled laborer.

Servants, numbering 453, constituted the next largest occupational group. They represented 31.9 per cent of the total number of occupations reported. In Samoa a servant is not necessarily a person engaged in domestic or personal service. He may be a laborer, a fisherman, a house carpenter, or other skilled workman, the term "servant" being generally used to indicate his relationship to the matai who directs his productive activities.

Among the skilled trades of the native Samoans may be mentioned those of house carpenter and boat or canoe builder. Only 12 Polynesians and persons of mixed blood were returned as carpenters, and only 2 as boat builders. These figures do not, of course, represent the total number of natives engaged in these skilled trades. All Samoan houses and canoes are built by native workmen; and as the Polynesian and mixed population numbers over 8,000, it is probable that a large number of the natives devote most of their labor to house and canoe building.

Only 6 persons were returned as planters, 3 being Polynesians, 1 of mixed blood, 1 Chinese, and 1 white. There is only a small amount of arable land in American Samoa. Each Samoan family has a title to its village and garden lands, and under existing laws this property can not be conveyed or sold to persons who are not Samoans. The interior waste and bush lands belong to the villages.

Among those engaged in professional and clerical service there were reported 22 clergymen, 20 of whom were Polynesians and 2 whites; 6 nurses, all Samoan women; 5 teachers; 9 white missionaries; and 18 clerks, 17 of whom were native Samoans and 1 a white man.

There were no native physicians or dentists reported in the census of American Samoa in 1920. The public health service, including the maintenance of a hospital for the natives at Pago Pago, is in charge of medical officers of the United States Navy. One member of the hospital corps is a qualified dentist.

AGRICULTURE.

Products.—The chief commercial product of the Samoan Islands, and practically the only article of export, is copra, or dried coconut meat, from which the oil is later expressed. The supply is abundant and of excellent quality and is readily marketed in San Francisco, Sydney, London, and Marseilles.

All copra produced for export is marketed for the natives by the American government. The government purchases the copra, stores it in government warehouses, arranges for its shipment, keeps all the accounts, and divides the surplus of money received from the sales over that paid to the natives for the copra among the several villages according to the amount of copra produced by each. Practically all of the copra produced in American Samoa in 1919 came from Tutuila (97.5 per cent), over two-thirds of it (67.5 per cent) coming from the Western District of Tutuila.

The following table shows the amount of copra produced in each district in 1919:

Such tropical fruits as oranges, bananas, grapefruit, limes, and citron are grown by the natives in limited quantities for home consumption but not for sale. The chief Samoan vegetables are breadfruit,

taro, and yams. The natives do no market gardening and keep no records of their production.

Although there are dense tropical forests on these islands, the timber is not suitable for commercial purposes. No sawmills have been constructed and no attempt has been made to develop a lumber industry.

A census of live stock was taken in connection with the census of population, the results of which are presented in the following table:

The natives raise large numbers of hogs, which are in great demand when feasts are given. Fresh beef is seldom used as food, although corned beef has long been a favorite delicacy of the natives. The number of horses and of cattle is constantly increasing, considerable stock having been imported in recent years for breeding purposes. It will be noted, however, that there were only 207 horses in the islands in 1920, all of them being in Tutuila. Horse-drawn vehicles were not introduced in American Samoa until 1911, and in 1912 there were only four carts on the islands. About 50 miles of public roads suitable for wheeled vehicles have been constructed since the establishment of the American government. These roads usually follow the shore lines and were originally intended for pedestrians only.
